LABOR PARTY SELECTS WOMAN

Candidate Selected by English Labor Party for Parliament is Woman.

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Aug. 9. (By Mail).—That the political party which above all parties stands for the hard-fisted sons of toil should put forward as one of its parliamentary candidates a member of the social order and a woman at that, may be regarded as one of the significant signs of the times. It is not because of any dearth of good parliamentary material among its own ranks and file that the Labor Party has adopted Miss Edith Picton-Turbervill as its candidate for North Islington at the next general election.

Miss Picton-Turbervill is the daughter of Colonel Picton-Turbervill of Twynham, Glamorgan-shire. Among the many claims of long descent, there are few among the British aristocracy who can trace their lineage so far back as can Miss Picton-Turbervill and find such a notable beginning of it. One of her ancestors was Sir Richard Turbervill, one of the 12 knights of William the Conqueror who settled in Wales soon after the conquest.

Miss Picton-Turbervill is the author of "Child and Intellectual Life," to which Lord Robert Cecil contributed a preface. Her social work abroad has given her an international reputation. She spent some years in India on behalf of the Young Women's Christian association, and travelled for it in America and other countries.

In stating her reasons for allying herself with the Labor Party, Miss Picton-Turbervill said: "The party has a definite, practical program. Its policy is founded on Christian principles. It has been the chief champion of woman's entry into politics."

PIUS XI IS PRACTICAL

Reorganization in Vatican with Arrival of New Pope: Pius XI comes of a Practical and Prosperous bourgeois Stock.

(By Associated Press.) ROME, July 20. (By Mail).—A fresh and searching study of inquiry and reorganization is blowing through the Vatican with the advent of the new Pope, and some of the old established dependents of palace, who are very numerous, find it altogether too irksome to be pleasant. Pius XI comes of a practical and prosperous bourgeois stock, and feels himself perfectly competent to lead into even the smallest details of the vast organization of which he is the head.

The Pontiff, while adhering on state and ceremonial occasions to all the pomp and splendor which is traditional in the Basilica of St. Peter and the Vatican Palace, desires that his private life be ruled by a truly apostolic simplicity and frugality, and he is reported to have said that he intends to spend money rather on the propagation of the Faith than on the restoration or beautifying of buildings and monuments.

In Italian households, humble or aristocratic, the cooks buy all that is necessary for the feeding of the family, and good housewives usually go through the cook's accounts every day in order to keep check of them. It appears that His Holiness does the same. It is related that the other day a fowl, price 20 lire (rather less than a dollar) was provided for the Pope's supper. For some reason he did not eat it, and orders were given that the following day the cook make chicken croquettes for lunch. The croquettes duly arrived, but when the accounts were looked through in the evening it was found that another fowl, price 20 lire, had been charged in the cook's book. The cook was called in and "had his head washed," which is the quaint Roman expression for getting a good scolding, and the Pope told him he had no use for any servant who was not strictly honest and accurate in his charges.

It appears that some of the administration of the huge Vatican Palace has been carried on in a rather haphazard fashion. For instance, thousands of lire were often paid for overtime work to the regular staff of workmen who receive weekly or monthly wages. The Pope, counting up the regular day's work and the overtime charged, pointed out that some men must have been working for considerably over 20 hours out of the 24. "I hope I shall never see such an item in the accounts again," said the Pontiff with a quiet twinkle in his eye; "it would be indeed cruel to expect anyone to overwork himself to that extent."

It has been discovered that the alterations and repairs to a papal palace in the Piazza S. Sebastiano, near St. Peter's, which is to be the seat of the Institute of Oriental Studies, have cost, although they are not nearly finished, more than would have sufficed to buy a whole new palace. A strict rule has therefore been made that no expenditure surpassing 500 lire may under any circumstances be made without the approval of a Commission consisting of Cardinals Gasparri, Merry del Val, De Lai and Sforzetti, to whom the Pope has entrusted the duty of looking into every fire that is paid out.

A special but unofficial election is to be held at the Vatican to decide upon who shall be mayor and commissioner of safety for the unexpired term of W. A. Jacks, who resigned last April.

Big Onion Crop Will be One of the Heavy Outputs of Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA, Aug. 28.—Onions grown in the Walla Walla section of Washington are reputed locally to have been developed from Spanish seed, according to a federal report. They are sometimes termed "French" onions or "Washington Yellow Globe", but since only one kind is raised in the immediate vicinity of Walla Walla they are called commercially "Walla Walla Yellow Globe." They are usually planted in the fall and thinned out in the spring for green onions. Occasionally "Frisetaters" are grown in the Walla Walla district, but they, too, can be described as yellow globe onions.

The Walla Walla crop will amount this year to about 600 cars, according to the district horticultural inspector, the crop having been cut in half by blights and Fusarium decay, the latter disease being especially bad in some fields. Onions are customarily pulled in that section while the tops are still green. They are sacked without curing roots intact, though they are allowed to remain in the field in the sacks a few hours for the cut neck to dry over.

The onions thus far have been generally very firm, although the dry scales easily fall off. Most of the stock is bright, the remainder being fairly bright. Many of the Walla Walla onions are not of particularly attractive shape, resembling "bottle necks." However, the peculiarity does not affect the grade, because they are northern-grown onions.

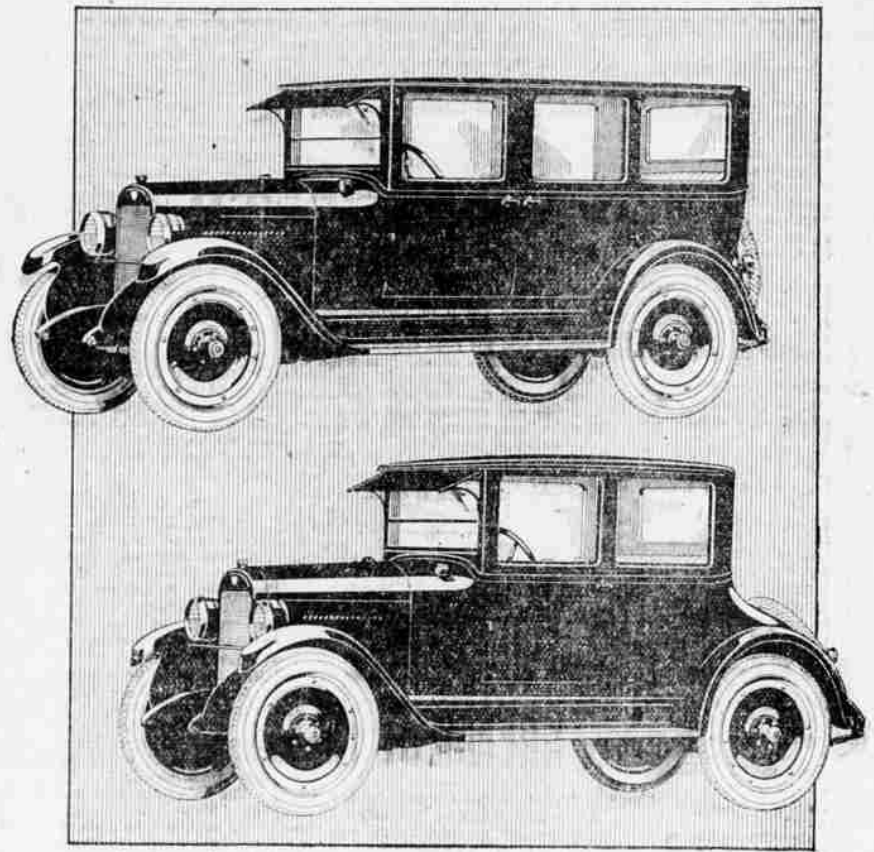
