EX-SERVICE MEN MUST TAKE ACTION
Men who have not filed their claims in the claim bureau for compensation, vocational training, or medical treatment, must do so within five years following their discharge from the service if their claims are to be considered," stated L. H. Wood, contact representative of the Veteran's War Service Bureau, who is in the city for a few days making his headquarters at the local Red Cross offices.
"All matters pertaining to claims against the veterans' bureau of re-instatement and conversion of war risk insurance should be taken up directly with the sub-division offices in Portland or with the local Red Cross headquarters," he continued.
"All war risk insurance must be converted into regular policy offered by the government by March 4, 1925," he concluded.
