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PLANS SET FOR SPEED CLASSIC

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 29.—Plans virtually have been completed for the 300 mile international speed classic, to be held over Kansas City's new 400,000 speedway, September 16. Racing followers declare that several records should be broken.

Entries have been received from the foremost drivers of the game, including Jimmy Murphy, 1922 A. A. A. champion, Harry Harts, runner-up to Murphy at the Indianapolis race this year, Tommy Milton, 1921 A. A. A. champion, Cliff Durant, Roscoe Sikes, Al Melby, Joe Thomas, Frank Elliott and Jeffry Wenderlich.

From the Pacific coast comes word that Bennett Hill, one of the entrants, is coming with a new car, specially designed, which has made 120 miles an hour.

The mile and a quarter road track banked at an angle of 17 degrees will permit a speed of 120 miles an hour, according to Jack Pruner, board track designer and originator, who had charge of its construction. The track will be ready for stipulation trials about September 5. The two steel grandstands will seat 35,000 persons.

The American Legion will inaugurate the new speedway in ceremonies presided by the race, Hartford McNider, national commander.

PLAN FOR BIG FOUR LEAGUE FOR UNEMPLOYED PLANS COLONY

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Aug. 5.—(By Mail)—Ratshelbunnet of an unemployed workers' colony in northern Queensland, suggested by the Unemployed Workers' committee, is to be placed before the premier, following its approval by a mass meeting of the unemployed.

The objects of the project are to relieve distress and to demonstrate that the working class is capable of managing and controlling industry, according to an announcement. It is suggested the colony obtain from the government 100 grants of land, and a cash subsidy equal to the amount raised by the colony, co-operate in clearing, irrigating and cultivating land, produce foodstuffs and maintain suitable quarters, libraries and recreation rooms. Compulsory labor will be the first rule of the colony and a committee to be chosen will detail any member to any occupation. The initial funds are to be raised by making a voluntary levy of one shilling weekly on workers.

"Big Four" Rumored.
But things promise to be vastly different next year. Rumors, and they are from reliable sources, are to the effect that a "Big Four" composed of Walla Walla, Baker, Pendleton and La Grande will be formed next year and needless to say, if the thing goes through, there will be four teams that will make things hum around the diamond throughout the season. In all likelihood another league, composed of other eastern Oregon towns, will be formed.

Better Teams Assured.
Such a league as has been suggested, comprised of cities composed of thousands of people instead of hundreds, would necessarily bring the quality of the teams to a much higher point. Every one of the four cities would be willing to back their team both financially and in spirit and with probably five or six series games, the season would be full of ball games of a higher standard than for many years.

La Grande, years ago, was a baseball town of the first water, but, in the last few years, the fans have become less in number and the town has not been behind the boys like it should. This year found a change in the above conditions. Under a new management and with a good team, the Pirates had the fans behind them throughout the season despite two or three games of ball that were not of the best brand. Several can say that they never missed a ball game and with seven games out of La Grande, that shows how the spirit was. And not only was the team this year a success from a playing standpoint, but also from the financial side.

Fans Want League.
Over a score of baseball fans in La Grande suggested that the team branch out and get into a league where better baseball is played and if it can be arranged, they will be satisfied next season. And with the "Big Four" in action, the writer prophesies that the talk about "better baseball in Idaho and Oregon" will be a thing of the past.
