DEAD MAN IS NOT MR. CURRY

Pendleton Officers Having a Hard Time in Identifying Corpse Found by the Roadside.

PENDLETON, Aug. 30.—The man whose body was interred here yesterday afternoon after being held for almost a week in an effort to establish identification was not C. V. Curry of Elgin, it became known last night when a telephone call was received by Sheriff Zoeth Houser from Elgin. The man who has been missing from there for the past two weeks bore a heavy scar on his forehead, according to the information received by the sheriff, and the stranger had no such marks.

Nothing tangible that is considered as likely to make identification assured has been secured during the past 24 hours. The suggestion has been put forward that the dead man was Peter Steele, Steele is known to have been planning to leave Pendleton some time Monday. He did not know where he would be after he left here, he told one business man. He is said to answer the description of the dead man.

Nothing that helped any in the problem of identifying the man or in establishing the manner of his death came to light in the coroner's inquest yesterday afternoon at the office of Brown and Brady.

The verdict of the jury was as follows: "We find that this man came to his death by unknown circumstances, and we are unable to determine who he is." The verdict bore the signatures of Rex Ellis, foreman; William E. Hanscomb, W. C. Crawford, H. Rasmussen, Frank Nagle and George Eckles.

The men who found the body as it lay in the brush near the river bank just off of the highway, 11 miles west of Pendleton, last Wednesday morning, the physician who conducted the most mortem examination, the deputy coroner, and other testified at the inquest.

Frank Boyden testified that the examination made by himself and Dr. Brown showed no clear cause of death. The neck of the man was not swollen, he declared, and there was no fracture of the skull and no blood clots on the brain. He gave it as his opinion that the man might have been hit over the head with a sandbag, and that death resulted from such a blow.

George Clark and Marvin Keen told of seeing the body in the brush and Deputy Coroner John B. Brady described the condition of the body as it was when found.

NEWSPAPERMAN STILL MISSING

Jean Kirkpatrick's Whereabouts Baffle Wife, Officers and Friends who are Searching.

PENDLETON, Aug. 30.—"Where's Daddy? Why doesn't he come home?" That is the plaint that is being made by the little son of Mr. and Mrs. Jean Kirkpatrick since the father disappeared two weeks ago today and has not since been heard from.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick, wife of the former publisher of the Pilot Rock Record, was here this morning after a trip which she made to Pilot Rock yesterday. Her mission to the neighboring town, and the former home of the Kirkpatrick family, was to deliver to the office the books and records of the plant which Mr. Kirkpatrick had taken with him to Walla Walla when he moved his family there recently.

"It is Mrs. Kirkpatrick's wish, as well as being the wish of the other members of the family, to assist in every way in clearing up the condition of the business of the paper," Hugh Kirkpatrick, brother of the missing man, said this morning. "Her mission to Pilot Rock was to deliver the books and give every other aid in her power to see that everything is made as clear as possible about the business."

Mrs. Kirkpatrick returned today to her home in Walla Walla.
