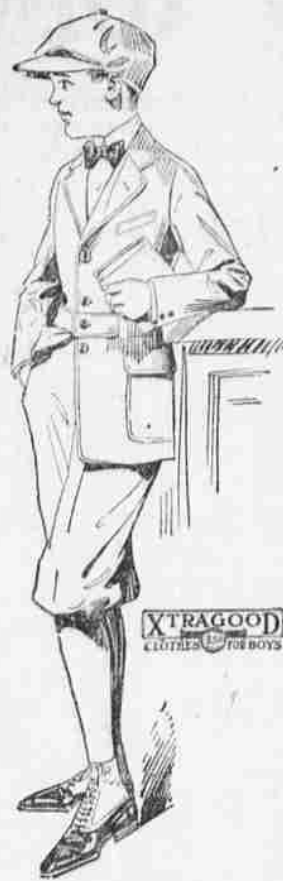

SOLVE SINGLE MAN PROBLEM

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 31.—In an attempt to find a solution for the "single man problem," The Spokane Social Service Bureau recently decided to cooperate with other local welfare organizations in an effort to find a satisfactory answer to the question.

"By the single man problem we mean the problem of the flouter, the man who applies to welfare organizations for assistance during the winter, and who often gives a different name every time he applies," said M. H. Passley, general secretary of the organization. "We believe that in order to prevent duplication, a central board composed of representatives of all the organizations should be established to handle these men."
