FALL PLANS FOR RADIO

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 31.—Plans for broadcasting throughout the northwest the speeches of assembly speakers at the University of Oregon and musical concerts held by the associated students of the university when the regular term begins this fall were announced here recently.
Last spring the university students voted to impose upon them a quarterly fee which would be used in paying the expenses of the most talented musicians obtainable. For this reason it is expected that the musical assemblies during the coming year will be entertained by many noted musicians. Several times during each term of the school year, speakers of national prominence address the student gatherings.
Garrett Lewis, a student at the University of Oregon, who possesses a high powered transmitting set, has offered to handle the broadcasting of the assembly programs. He believes this can be handled without difficulty by constructing a tower from his station to the assembly platform.

ANCIENT SAFE ON EXHIBIT

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 31.—The first safe ever used in the state of Montana was exhibited at the state bankers' convention here recently. It is the property of Mr. Frank V. Worden, Mrs. Sterling's father, brought it to his Hell Gate trading post over the newly constructed Mullan road from Walla Walla, Wash., during the summer of 1860. The safe, on a raised platform, was conspicuous in the log store of Worden and Co.

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In the winter of '62 '64, Skinner, Carter, Cooper, Zachary, Shears and Graves, members of Plummer's band of road agents, came to Hell Gate, making ready to escape north with the approach of spring to the Kootenai mines.

During their stay at Hell Gate, Skinner and his wife conducted a saloon. Members of this band, of which Skinner was the leader, did most of their loading in the Worden and Co. store. During these visits, Skinner used this safe as his seat. At the time there were in the safe 1,500 ounces of gold dust.

On the morning of January 2, 1864, twenty-one Vigilantes from Alder Gulch rode into Hell Gate. First seeing Skinner, then Carter, then on down the line. The Vigilantes gave the road agents speedy trials. The trials were short, judgments decisive, and the executions of all orderly performed.

Mr. Worden said there was no doubt in his mind but that Skinner and his band had fully intended looting the safe on their start to the Kootenai diggings. He decided to take no further chances and on the June following, packed the dust to Fort Benton and thence by steamer conveyed it to St. Louis.

HARDING GETS MAGNA CHARTA

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 31.—President Harding is to receive a beautifully framed copy of Magna Charta from the Magna Charta Day association. It was announced today by J. W. Hamilton of St. Paul, founder and secretary of the association.
The copy, which will be 22 by 30 inches, will show the seals of the barons who participated in the signing of the document, and it will be in colors.
A small brass plate, outlining the presentation to the president as the honorary president of the Magna Charta Day association, is attached to the frame.
A copy of the Magna Charta also will be presented to Governor E. Lee Trinkle of Virginia, in recognition of his act as the first governor to issue a proclamation calling for observance of Magna Charta day.

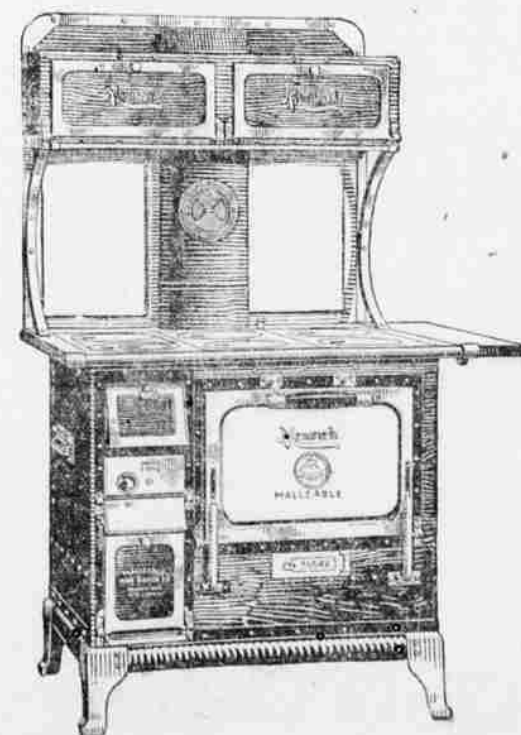
