DOOKIE PROGRAM NOW COMPLETED

Final Arrangements Made For Car of Visiting Dokies; Two Full Days of Activity Prepared.

The committee for the reception of the Dokies has been a busy organization in the past few days. A hum of activity and careful preparations have resulted in the completion of a program for the two days' meeting of the Pacific Northwest Association of D. O. K. K. temples that promises to keep every minute during both days full of activity for the visitors. Printed copies of the program with general information relative have been finished and will be distributed to all Dokies. Every possible arrangement has been made for the best sort of entertainment for the Dokies from the time they arrive until the closing hour. La Grande opens her doors to the Knights of Khorassan!

Program Arranged. The local headquarters have completed the two days' program which commences Friday morning with the arrival of the Dokies who will first register at headquarters in the Y. M. C. A. building, where they will receive instructions, badges, and rooms, which will be assigned to them when they register.

At ten o'clock the Pacific Northwest Association of D. O. K. K. temples will gather at the Knights of Pythias hall. Luncheon will be served from eleven until one o'clock both days at the Baptist church, Catholic church, Roman hall, Christian church, Gayles' hall, Methodist church, Rehearsal hall and at the Salvation Army in addition to the meals that may be obtained in the La Grande restaurants.

Tour the Valley. Auto rides over the Grande Ronde valley will be the first item on the Friday afternoon program. Courtesy cars will leave the Y. M. C. A. building at this hour. The ladies will be guests at the Country Club, which will open its doors to visitors.

At two o'clock the ceremonial will begin at the Rex Hall and at five to seven o'clock, on both days, dinner will be served at the above mentioned places.

Stunt Night. Beginning at seven thirty o'clock in the Ball Park, official stunt night will be held. Dokies will be entitled to box seats upon presentation of their necessary tickets and the wearers of the fez will be entitled to sit in the grand stand. Admission is free. And the evening of the opening day will be well rounded off with a street dance and merri gram on Adams avenue from 9:30 to 12 o'clock.

Patrol Team Contest. On the morning of the second day at ten o'clock the official delegates will again meet at the K. of P. hall and at the same hour the patrol team contest will take place in the Ball Park. Winners of the first and second prizes will be given special place in the parade upon consulting headquarters.

In the afternoon at two o'clock the band and drum corps will vie for first honors at the Ball Park and with the galaxy of bands scheduled to be present, the contest should be of the first water.

Open House at Hot Lake. Dr. W. T. Phyl will open the doors of the Hot Lake Sanatorium at 3:45 o'clock for visiting ladies other than wives of Khaled Temple members, who will be transported to Hot Lake in courtesy cars that will leave the Y. M. C. A. building at the mentioned time.

Mammoth Parade. The final evening will be devoted to a mammoth fraternal parade which will form at Washington and 9th streets with the following line of march: Washington to Adams on Hemlock, down Adams from Hemlock to Fourth, up Fourth to O, down O to Sixth, north on Sixth to Washington and disband.

Following the street parade the street dance and Merri Gram of the evening before will be repeated and at midnight the entire number of bands and drum corps will march at the street and Adams avenue, and to the strains of the massed music, all will sing "Till We Meet Again."

Information bureaus and general headquarters are situated in the Y. M. C. A. building at the Ad Club of free. Free baths, free messengers, free courtesy cars, free auto rides, free rest rooms, and a rest park are all open to the Dokies and full information may be obtained from the information bureau.

SINGH VS. THYE FOR TITLE

Probably the greatest wrestling match that La Grande has ever seen will take place Friday evening at the Star Theatre when Ted Thye, middle-weight wrestling champion of the world, formerly a La Grande boy, will meet Basanta Singh, middle-weight Hindu champion, of Calcutta, India, in a championship contest, best two out of three falls, the double wrist lock to be barred on account of Thye not making the required weight.

Singh has met Thye twice before, losing the first match in two straight falls and tying Thye six months later in a two hour and five minute match. The double wrist lock is one of Thye's strong holds but as he outweights Singh considerably and would not make the weight, he agreed to permit that hold to be barred. Singh weighs 170 pounds and Thye tipped the scales at 165.

Ted Thye was formerly a resident of La Grande, working in the O. W. shops until he began to attain prominence in the wrestling game. Leaving La Grande he made Portland his headquarters and succeeded in grappling his way to the middle weight championship of the world.

Basanta Singh has been wrestling in the United States for several years and has gradually been climbing the ladder until he now wields the middle-weight championship. Singh was born in India, where he has property interests and got his start there as wrestling in the national game in India. He is training daily at the Y. M. C. A. at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon and is doing roadwork in the morning. Today is his last day of heavy training.

The match will be held under Police Gazette rules and will be preceded by a first class preliminary match.

By request of the Dokies, who will hold stunt night at the Ball Park Friday evening, the match will not begin until nine o'clock.

CRITES-SARP MATCH TONIGHT

Frankie Crites and Kid Sarp will meet this evening at the Star theatre arrayed in leather gloves and each determined to make the quickest work possible of his opponent. Both men range a few pounds over 150 and are about evenly matched, according to fans.

Crites arrived in the city last evening and is circulating among the local leather gloves and fight fans confident of adding Sarp's scalp to his many other victories. Crites is an experienced ring man, having fought in about forty fights. Sarp, as local followers well know, is no green set-up himself, having spent a year in the ring in La Grande, boxed in the A. E. P. arenas, and spent several other years following the fistie game.

Both men are fit as a fiddle and have been training hard for the contest, and when these two punchers take the ring, things will begin to happen in great style.

Preliminary to the main bout, Ernest Palmer and Farmer Smith will mix in a six-round ringer-up to the main event. Both boys are tough customers and generally end up things with a knockout. The Ford brothers will crank up their engine and get going earlier in the evening also.

The boxing card, under the auspices of the La Grande Municipal Boxing Commission, will commence at 8:30 o'clock at the Star theatre this evening.

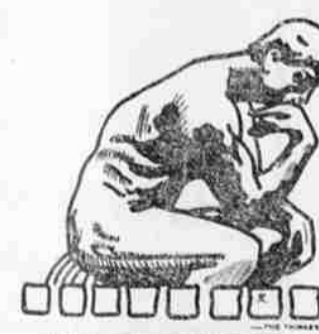
