Vogel Bros. of Union, who carried on a test of Hybrid 128 wheat in comparison with Forty Fold this year, re-

port considerable increase in yield for the Hybrid over and above the Forty Fold. Both varieties were planted in the same field under like conditions and the completion of the threshing returned an average of 46.5 bushels of Hybrid wheat as compared with Forty Fold, which made an average of 40 bushels. Many farmers have watched this plot with interest as it gives a good indication as to the value of Hybrid in the Union section.

Win. Vogel states that the Forty Fold had a slight advantage over the Hybrid as they were unable to get water over more than a small portion of the Hybrid when irrigating, while the entire field of Forty Fold was well irrigated. The wheat from the Hybrid plot was of a very high quality, as a selected sample tested by Mr. Crouter of the Union flouring mill weighed an even 61 pounds to the bushel. Vogel Bros. had only nine acres of Hybrid this year and the remainder of their winter wheat was Forty Fold. They have retained the seed from this nine acres and are sowing 100 acres of Hybrid for 1923 and the surplus seed which they grew has all been spoken for by neighboring farmers. They believe that with an increased yield of almost seven bushels they cannot afford to grow Forty Fold. The test was carried on in co-operation with the County Agent and yields were carefully

checked for accurate results. In addition to growing a good crop of wheat, Vogel Bros. are showing the truck gardeners how to raise tomatoes this year. From sixteen plants which they set out, they have been harvesting ripe tomatoes since July 15 and have not only supplied themselves but many neighbors and friends. They attribute their success with the tomatoes, first, to the work of Mrs. Vogel, and secondly, to their method

of handling them, which was to keep all branches and side shoots pruned down. The tomatoes were stacked up and kept pruned the entire season. As many as seventy tomatoes were hanging on one plant when observed last week.
