Silk Makers
Warned of Ruin

Japanese Raw Silk Manu-
facturers are Warned of
Artificial Stimulation is Dan-
gerous.

YOKOHAMA, Japan, Aug. 4.—(By
Mail)—Japanese raw silk manufactur-
ers who recently decided to withhold
thirty per cent of their output from
the Yokohama market have been warn-
ed by American buyers that this arti-
ficial stimulation of the trade might
lead to its ruin. A paper prepared by
C. E. Doney, General Manager of the
United States Testing company, and
read at a meeting of sericulturists and
reelers explained how this rule might
be brought about by the use of sub-
stitutes unless the Japanese could
bring down prices by means of labor
saving devices.

Explaining that the imports to and
production in the United States of arti-
ficial silks had increased nearly six-
fold in nine years and that more fac-
tories were being built he declared
that prices must decline. He added:
"The flature men of Japan cannot
more effectively play their industry

into the hands of their rivals, than
by devoting their energies, skill and
business sagacity to the artificial
maintenance of prices either by re-
stricting the supply of raw silk be-
low the normal demand or by estab-
lishing a fixed minimum price for ex-
port as was done in 1920. The fact
that the New York market begins to
hesitate at above 2,000 yen should
be evidence that the American manu-
facturer cannot longer make and sell
silk goods to the American public at
prices based upon raw silk above that
figure. He could in 1919 and 1920
when the prices of finished goods con-
tinued to rise.

"The action of the market in recent
months would seem to indicate that
with a uniform stable market between
1,800 yen and 2,000 yen the American
manufacturer can do a fair business but
above that he cannot meet competition
with other fabrics. In cotton, arti-

POLITICIANS HOUSE TAKEN

KOBE, Japan, Aug. 13.—(By Mail)
—A Japanese house which formerly
stood in Kojimachi, the official center
of Tokyo, and which was the residen-
ce of statesmen of the Meiji era
when those carrying on the govern-

ment of the country had to meet in
secret to avoid assassins, has been re-
covered here at the residence of Baron
Nakano Kawanishi at Futatabi Hill.

The house was the residence of the
late Prince Iwakura, an ex-premier,
who, with Prince Ito, Saionji and oth-
er elder statesmen frequently met here
to discuss affairs of state. The Meiji
Emperor paid his advisers a visit there
on a memorial July 19 and this date
was selected for the dedication at
Futatabi Hill.

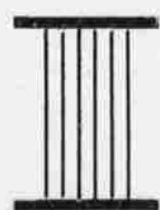
