## SPECIAL TRAIN FOR BACHELORS

MISSOULI, Mont., Sept. 6.—The Bitter Root valley, north of here, is to have a new male train to be known as the "Bachelor's Special." The special will carry "adult male passengers only," from whence it derives its name.

The new train is believed here to be the only exclusive "male train" operated on any railroad in the United States at the present time.

The decision to limit the train to men only was reached because the train will handle a large amount of freight, necessitating considerable switching. On account of the hazard incident to the switching, railroad company officials thought it advisable to limit the passenger service to men.

## INSECTS LURE MANY PEOPLE

LONDON, Aug. 9.—(By Mail)—Not the gross eating of the carnivorous animals, but the dainty feeding of the butterflies, today attracts many people to the Zoological Gardens, at least those people who appreciate what has been pronounced the prettiest sight in the zoo. There could be no greater contrast than that afforded by a lion or a tiger snarling over a mass of flesh and bones and a flight of beautiful butterflies sipping honey.

Every hour when the sun shines Miss Cheesman, Curatrix of Insects, enters the spacious butterfly cage at the zoo and regales her charges, hundreds of peacocks, tortoise-shells, brilliant green-veined whites, and other butterflies galore, on diluted honey.

There are plenty of flowers in the enclosure but artificial feeding is necessary, for the blossoms do not provide sufficient nectar for the thirsty insects, and they are so quickly fertilized by the frequent visits of the butterflies that they soon turn to seed.

On entering the cage with the mixture Miss Cheesman is mobbed by the hovering throng—like a donor of cakes and sweets at a picnic of school children—the gaily-hued insects settling all over her and assembling in a group upon the honey-can.

The scene at such a time suggests an animated kaleidoscope or some fairy spectacle.

## EMPLOYMENT FOR THE IDLE

(By Associated Press.)

LONDON, Aug. 16. (By Mail)—One result of the Washington Disarmament Conference has been to provide employment for thousands of idle men, who will be engaged for many months in reducing Britain's sea monsters to scrap. There are 11 battleships, several light cruisers, and considerable smaller craft awaiting destruction in accordance with the Washington naval limitation treaty. It will require many months of laborious work to completely dismantle them.

## BUYS TRACTORS FOR THE TURKS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 6.—(By Mail)—The vital need of machine power in Turkey has been obvious and urgent as a result of the exhaustion of the available supply of animals in the long-drawn wars, is the opinion of American Consul-General G. B. Ravndal. "Most of the draft animals have been used for cavalry and artillery purposes, and many of them to supply food for the soldiers," he continued, speaking to the representatives of The Associated Press. "Consequently a demand is arising for the tractor and the plow. American tractors as well as other American-made farm machinery, possess a fine reputation in Turkey, and at present dominate the market. The Kahnemann (German), Fiat (Italian), and Renault (French) tractors are in the field, but they cannot compete successfully with American machines which are being offered. The chief desiderata are price, efficiency and simplicity, and the American tractors have been found to fill these requirements."

Similar consideration apply to other agricultural machines and to tillage instruments, for which the demand is growing in the Near East. These include reapers and binders, threshing machines, plows, harrows, cultipackers and drills.

There appears to be good ground for encouraging American manufacturers of agricultural implements and machinery to pay increasing attention to the near eastern field. Mr. Ravndal went on. In the extension of this trade it is essential to give credit to dealers in order that they may be able to carry out the practical demonstrations which are so necessary in these virgin markets, and to accommodate the farmers financially. It is also important that measures be taken to have a full supply of spare parts on hand in suitable repair shops.

The opportunities for the development of the Anatolian, Thracian and adjoining markets for agricultural machinery and implements are considered very good," the Consul-General continued. "The situation at the present time is adversely affected by the

absence of highways and railways and other means of transporting farm produce to the central markets, but this defect is certain gradually to be remedied. No duty is charged for the admittance of agricultural machinery into Turkey. As a rule, general agencies are established in Constantinople with branches in other cities."

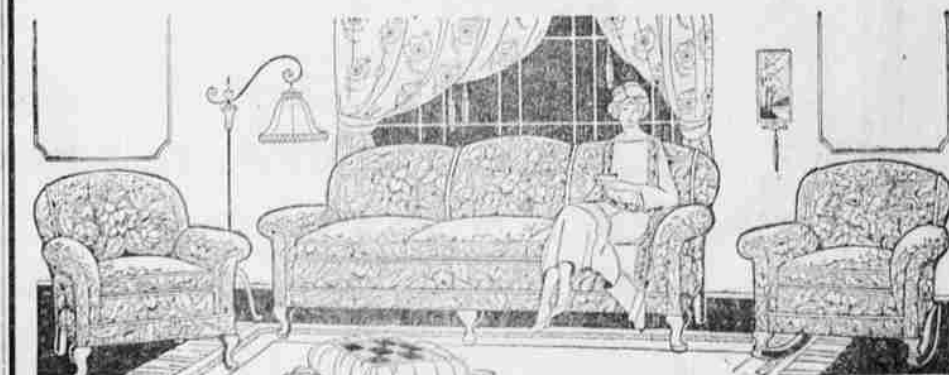
