TRICKS LIFE IS FILMING  
"SATURDAY NIGHT"

Beatrice Joy and Jack Mower narrowly escaped serious injuries in the driving of an automobile accident episode in "Saturday Night," Cecil B. DeMille's latest Paramount picture, which will be the attraction at the Arcade theatre today. But the narrowest escape came when Miss Joy stumbled accidentally and fell on the railroad tracks a hundred feet above the ground.

In this episode Miss Joy and Mr. Mower attempt to cross a railroad trestle in an automobile only to be trapped midway by an approaching electric train. In their frantic efforts to escape they risk for a distant end of the trestle. Realizing that this is impossible, Mower was to force Miss Joy to climb over the edge of the trestle with him where the pair would have disappeared while the train reached above them, scrapping the automobile.

While filming the scene in which the trapped pair attempted to outrun the train, Miss Joy stumbled over one of the ties and fell, rolling within a few inches of the edge of the trestle. Miss Joy, from constant work at that height and surprised by the fall, she was powerless to help herself. Only good fortune saved her from falling to certain death.

Although the stumble was purely accidental, Mr. DeMille required the scene in the picture on the ground that it was absorbing material. Cecil DeMille, Edith Roberts, June Day and Theodore Roberts have important roles.

### IRRIGATIONISTS IN VALLEY MEET

CORVALLIS, Sept. 7.—A Willamette valley irrigation field meet at the Oregon Experiment station at Corvallis September 9 is expected to bring many progressive farmers from all sections of the valley. The extended dry weather this season stimulated the interest in irrigation in the valley so that the formation of irrigation districts is being contemplated and the number of water users in individual districts has been increased.

Ferry Chase, county engineer, and President Fred Wallace of the state irrigation congress, are expected to speak following luncheon. The latter one, many of whom are planning to come by automobile, are asked to bring sandwiches for the luncheon to be held at the pumping plant. Coffee and watermelon will be provided.

The experiment station has been using water for 14 years. The value of irrigation on several staple crops can be seen at this season. Water has saved the clover stand for the last two years in the irrigation fields.

As a 12-year average the irrigated fields have produced 100 tons more hay per acre, 70 bushels more potatoes, five bushels more beans, and 100 more bushels of wheat.

A small pumping plant will be operated for the visitors and measure and application of water will be demonstrated by the station specialists.

### CELEBRITIES GET INVITATION

Queen Marie of Roumania, is invited to National Convention of American Legion Auxiliary.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 6.—Queen Marie of Roumania has been invited to the national convention of the American Legion Auxiliary in New Orleans October 16-20, Mrs. Lowell F. Hobart, Auxiliary national president, announced today. An invitation also was extended to Mrs. Warren G. Harding, Mrs. Hobart said.

The invitation to Queen Marie was forwarded to Bucharest through Frederick C. Nemo, Roumanian charge d'affaires at Washington. Distinguished for her work among soldiers of the allies during the World war, the Roumanian queen is one of the most popular rulers in Europe among American legionnaires.

The Auxiliary plans to entertain some of the most prominent men and women in the country during the national convention to be held in connection with the annual gathering of the Legion. John J. Tilley, United States commissioner of education, has accepted an invitation to address the convention, and a similar acceptance is expected from George H. Dreyer, president of the American Literary Association.

### STERILIZER TO ISSUE BOOK.

ASTORIA, Sept. 7.—Dr. S. A. Owens-Ahair, mother of the movement for sterilization of criminals and the feebleminded in Oregon, has practically completed the book she is writing on the history of the movement for sterilization, eugenics and the prevention of degeneration. The volume will go to press about October 1, she said today. Dr. Owens-Ahair will leave within a few weeks for the state of Washington to assist in a fight to be made there for sterilization legislation.

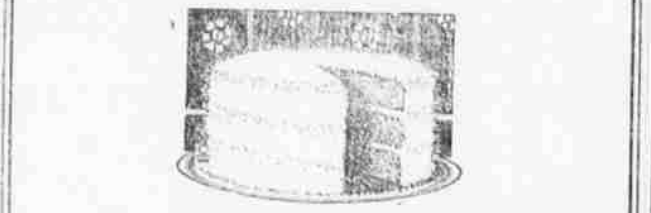
