

EPISCOPAL CONVENTION IS OPENED

Opening of 47th Triennial General Convention of the Episcopal Church in the United States Held Yesterday.

PORTLAND, Sept. 7.—The church cannot countenance violent methods or an unfair day's pay or an unfair day's work, or the breaking of agreements, but it must never lose its interest, nor forget its obligation to the Master's name, for the multitude in the hard places of life, said the Rev. Edwin S. Lines, D. D., Bishop of Newark, in his convention sermon here today at the opening session of the 47th triennial General Convention of the Episcopal Church in the United States.

"The church must be able to give voice to the aspirations and hopes and desires of this multitude for something better in life for themselves and their children. Out from unspoiled homes are to come those who shall maintain the life of the church and the service of religion."

Use Gold's Rule.
"The church has stood for charity and relief and mercy," continued Bishop Lines. "Emphasis must be put on social justice and fellowship and the Golden Rule, upon duties rather than rights. No one can see the way in which our great cities have grown up with their homes of luxury and extravagance, waste and selfish comfort at one end, and mean streets and comfortless homes and squalid conditions at the other end of town, without feeling that it is semi-panem rather than Christianity."

"The church must make its own cause of the unprivileged people, those who are in hard places—life, of those upon whom the existing social and industrial order presses heavily, while it must stand against injustice and unfairness on both sides."

Revolt Against Suppression.
"I wonder that the world is in revolt against the old and existing order, whether it be in society or industry or in customs and manner of living. It is largely a revolt against suppression and worn out customs and traditions and it had to come in a world which was setting down under the impression that money making and selfish prosperity and pleasure seeking are the main things in life. It is a subject for rejoicing that an increasing number of intelligent business men are endeavoring in a Christian way to solve industrial difficulties, seeing the right man's point of view and giving it consideration. We will rejoice that labor is no more thought of as a mere commodity by right-minded business men and that human welfare is counted more than the value of property, and that the remedy for the world's ills is recognized as moral and spiritual rather than economic."

Religion Needed.
Bishop Lines declared that these perplexing industrial questions and contentions cannot be settled without religion. His sermon, which was unusually striking in the keynote of the convention which assembled today with delegates present from all parts of the world, was a strong appeal for the development of church leadership to meet present-world conditions. He urged that it was the duty of the church in the fulfillment of its mission never to rest content with what has been accomplished, but constantly to move forward. He drew a vivid picture of the events of the past eight years, which he spoke of as "The World in Revolt," and compared with the spirit of disintegration and revolt which is prevalent through all history.

"The hope of the church," he declared, "is moving forward out of the land of ease and contentment, out of the land of prejudice and narrow vision. The church in action, holding fast to what is old and well settled but dealing intelligently with existing conditions and questions, fighting with unwavering courage against what is wrong, and spending overmuch time upon small questions, but concentrating upon what is large and vital, must make its journey and tell out the truth."

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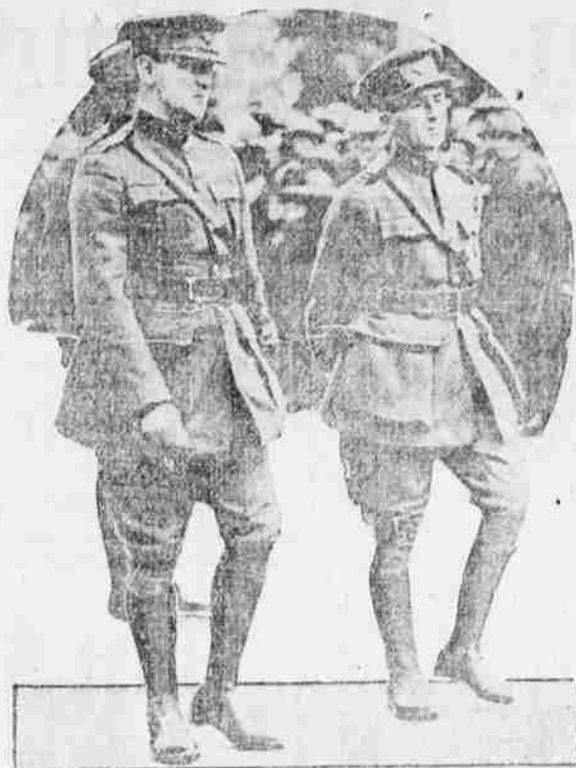
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Their Last Photo Together

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INDIAN LABOR IS NEW ISSUE

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Aug. 13.—By Mail.—The "White Australia" policy is likely to become an issue at the next federal elections of the government proposes a bill to give effect to the request of S. Satri regarding the status of Indians in the Commonwealth, politicians agree.

Mr. Satri said, just prior to his departure for New Zealand and Canada after having visited all principal cities in Australia, that Premier Hughes had been a warm supporter of the proposal that the matter was discussed at the last Imperial Conference and, together with the representatives of the other Dominions except South Africa, had pledged himself to remove all political disabilities under which Indians in the Commonwealth labor.

When Mr. Satri addressed the Commonwealth parliament the Nationalists and Country Party members applauded him, but the Labor members showed no enthusiasm. Several Labor members professed a belief that Mr. Satri's speech was the beginning of a campaign to break down the barrier to Indian immigration.

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MEDICAL MEN TO VISIT U. S.

TOKIO, Aug. 16.—(By Mail.)—The minister of education on behalf of the Japanese Government has accepted an invitation from Doctor George E. Vincent, President of the Rockefeller Foundation of New York, to name and send a commission of Japanese medical scientists to visit the medical institutions of the United States and Canada as the guests of the Rockefeller foundation.

The idea originated with Dr. Vincent, who was in the Far East some time ago in connection with the activities of the Rockefeller Foundation in China, and was prompted partly by the success that attended the visits to America of similar commissions from Great Britain, Brazil and Belgium.

The invitation, transmitted by Baron Shidehara, Japanese Ambassador to Washington, suggests that the com-

mission should consist of four or five men, well-known as representatives of the important branches of medical science and of the principal medical universities and institutes of the country; that this commission would be the guests of the Rockefeller Foundation from the time it leaves Japan until it returns again to these shores; and that the spring of 1923 would be the most suitable time for this visit, which should last for about three months.

The minister of education, in accepting the invitation, expressed his approval of the suggestions and in-
