REAL APACHE HAUNTS IN "THE GREEN TEMPTATION"

The haunts of the Parisian Apaches are reproduced in Betty Compson's latest Paramount picture, "The Green Temptation."

This is somewhat of a triumph in motion picture architecture, as these dens have never before been exactly duplicated, for tourists are seldom admitted to these underground resorts in the old Roman catacombs of this mysterious group of Parisian secret societies.

The replicas were made possible, however, by the co-operation of Prof. Sigurd Russell, for twenty years a resident of Paris and now a French instructor, and Theodore Kosloff, screen player, who plays the villain role of the chief Apache in the new picture.

There he observed the habits and customs of the Anchoas, which he has helped bring to the screen in "The Green Temptation."

This picture, said to be a masterly production, was adapted by Monte M. Katterjohn and Julia Crawford Ivers, from the magazine story "The Noose," by Constance Lindsay Skinner. Other cast in the cast besides those mentioned are Mahlon Hamilton, Neely Edwards, Edward Burns, Lynore Lynard and Mary Thurman.

WILL EXPLORE BAFFIN LAND

THE PAS, Man, Sept. 7.—A party of three Quebec explorers, under the leadership of Alfred Tremblay, an Arctic explorer of note, now are on the way to the Arctic Seas where investigations of Baffin Land and at the Magnetic Pole will be conducted.

Mr. Tremblay's party will be the first in history to attempt the journey, which they are undertaking by canoe and afoot. The party has four specially built freighting canoes and some 8,000 pounds of freight. Their equipment includes all the latest instruments.

The expedition is a private one and marine, land, general and geological surveys will be carried out. The trip will occupy approximately two years. Tremblay has made many trips into the Arctic region. He was only in when he made his first journey. He was a member of Captain Bernier's expedition of 1910-11, 1912-13.

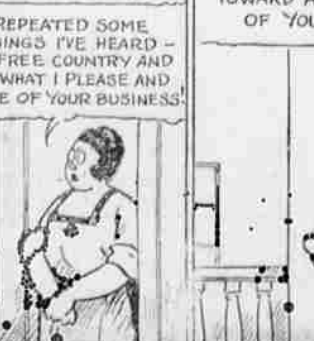
