BLACK YOUCO, FAMOUS WAR CHARGER, DIES

(By Associated Press)

FREMONT, Ohio, Sept. 8.—Black Youco, war horse, Colonel Webb C. Hayes' charger throughout the Cuban and Porto Rican campaigns, and during the Philippine insurrection twenty-five years ago, is dead and has been buried with full military honors. The flag of his country was draped about the body of the veteran as he was lowered into his grave.

LEDBETTER HAS LARGE WHEAT CROP

Incomplete Reports Show W. R. Ledbetter of Alice Leading With High Crop Average in County.

Harvesting is practically completed in the Grande Ronde valley, especially the threshing of the winter wheat, although work is still in progress on the spring variety and a few isolated late plots of winter wheat. Throughout the county the average yield of winter wheat appears to be a little less than thirty bushels to the acre and the yield of spring wheat as can be ascertained, about 19 or 20 bushels per acre.

Largest Yield.
The largest average yield to the acre in winter wheat so far reported goes to W. R. Ledbetter, of Alice, who has one of the finest wheat farms in the valley. On ninety acres of Hybrid 128 winter wheat, Ledbetter realized a little better than 40 bushels per acre and on 75 acres of the same wheat, cut a little later, he realized 47 bushels per acre.

Ledbetter's threshing outfit has been steadily at work during the entire season and has harvested several other crops in addition to his own. General statistics show that Hybrid 128 is averaging a little better than 30 bushels per acre and that Fortyfold, a winter wheat, is yielding a fraction below 30 bushels per acre. The opinion in the valley is in general that Hybrid 128 is a superior wheat in this valley and adapts itself to conditions in a better manner. The planting of Hybrid 128 on a much larger scale is looked forward to this fall. Hybrid 128 is a comparatively late variety in this section of the state.

Other Yields.
The Sam F. H. farm near Elgin, where two test plots of Hybrid 128 and Fortyfold wheat were planted, again pointed towards the former's superiority. Conditions were not the best on the farm but nevertheless the Hybrid 128 yielded 37 bushels to the acre while Fortyfold fell to 27 bushels.

On Bernal Hug's farm near Elgin Fortyfold yielded six sacks, or about 12 bushels, to each acre and Hybrid 128 netted about 22 bushels or 10 sacks. Reports from the Union and North Powder sections have not been received yet but from all indications, the wheat crop near Alice, Imbler and Elgin is producing the largest bushels.

TIME TO FILE CLAIMS EXPIRES

Disabled Veterans Have A Little Time Yet to Make their Claims Against the Government.

Despite the fact that the time limit for securing certificates of injury for war disabilities expired August 9 of this year, disabled war veterans of the Pacific Northwest have until five years after discharge to file claims against the government for compensation, according to L. C. Joseph, northwest head of the United States Veterans' Bureau. In many cases, however, the five year period expires during this fall or the coming winter, which calls for hasty action on the part of the veteran, he stated. Because many veterans believe that the time limit for claim filing has expired, the Veterans' Bureau is eager that every veteran of Washington, Oregon and Idaho know that immediate action on his part in the matter of making proper claims for compensation will protect him in case his disability now non-compensable, becomes aggravated after the five-year period, Mr. Joseph said.

With 75 per cent of its 916 hospitalized war veterans in government hospitals under control of the Veterans' Bureau, this district of the bureau operates favorably with any district in the United States in the matter of

eliminating treatment of disabled war veterans in contract hospitals. It is the aim of the bureau to have all disabled veterans treated in government institutions.

Establishment of an employment service in connection with the Veterans' Bureau has relieved unemployment among rehabilitated war veterans materially, it was announced. Approximately 75 veterans who have completed their vocational training courses have been placed in positions through this agency during the last six weeks. Employers of Washington, Oregon and Idaho are urged to give these disabled war veterans, now expert along various lines, first opportunity to fill vacancies or new positions.

FORGET-ME-NOT DAY IS NAMED

C. Hamilton Cook, national commander of the disabled American veterans of the World war, has notified local municipal authorities that La Grande is expected to participate in America's "National Forget-Me-Not Day." A general chairman of a Citizens' Committee will be appointed by city manager Kratz and it is expected that La Grande and surrounding district will do its full share on Forget-Me-Not Day, which is a day set aside for wounded and disabled veterans and the date is Saturday, November 4th. On this day the public-spirited citizens everywhere in the country will take an active part in the distribution of forget-me-nots in every city and town in the United States; the proceeds of the sales which will be used exclusively—100%—for the disabled men of the country, whether members of any organizations or not. Briefly, these funds which are to be deposited with banks in the different cities and towns in which the local committees hold their activities, will be applied towards the national state and local relief of the wounded and disabled veterans of the World war, expediting national legislation in their behalf, including hospitalization, rehabilitation and employment; clubhouses are to be built and summer camps organized, where the men who sacrificed almost their entire future can join hands as comrades again, through the little but splendid remembrance from the people of the nation.

ANOTHER QUARTZ MILL

BAKER, Sept. 8.—There will be another mill in operation in the Grande Ronde district, Charles Zahner, who recently leased the Magnolia mill for treating ore from the Blue Ribbon mine, expects to have the plant running in a short time. The mill has been overhauled and the ore concentrated in a short run of a few hours has made a good showing. To overcome the shortage of water for the plant he is now bringing water from Crane Creek. This work will soon be completed and Mr. Zahner, who is in the city for a few days, says continuous operation will be started.

M. Zahner reports the Independence mill is running steadily and the mine is sending regular shipments of concentrates to Sunnyside, from where it is shipped over the Sumpter Valley to the Oregon-Idaho Investment company in Baker.
