LAND PLASTER IS STANDBY

The use of land plaster has increased rapidly in Union county in the past five years, the first trials having been made on the farms of Frank McKenney, Will Ledbetter and Dan Clark.

Because of the bad financial conditions prevailing generally and the low price of hay in particular, not many Union county farmers secured land plaster last year, but this year the Imbler farmers have ordered two carloads, and farmers near La Grande have ordered one carload and a second is in prospect.
