## NOVEL RACES FOR THE FAIR

WALLOWA, Sept. 16.—An innovation in the way of races will be instituted at the Wallowa county fair at

Enterprise this fall. This race will be a Ford relay, two miles a day for three days. Only Ford touring cars without self-starters will be permitted to enter. The rules provide that the start shall be made in front of the grand stand, each driver standing in front of his car. At the starting signal each must crank his own car.

At the end of each half mile the engine of each car must be killed and re-cranked by its driver. The best time for the three days wins.

In the bucking contests the rule which requires the use of "Association saddles" has been amended so that the use of no saddle is barred provided it is less than fifteen inches wide at the pommel. The rule as amended will permit the use of deep seated saddles, also the use of buck balls on narrow fronted saddles.

In the way of exhibits the committee confidently predicts that the coming fair will be the greatest ever held in Wallowa county. More interest seems to be evinced throughout the country than ever before and the interest extends to every department of the fair. The new cattle barn which is being built will provide stall room for 116 head and from inquiries being received it is expected that it will overflow. The re-arrangement of the premium list as it affects exhibits of grain, by which first premium of \$20 and second premium of \$10 are being offered, seems to have struck a popular chord, and everything indicates a great showing in those lines.

## DODGE BROTHERS ADD BODY PLANT

L. C. Smith, La Grande distributor for Dodge cars, is of the opinion that the future consumption of Dodges will have an increase. In this opinion also shares the factory, for according to Mr. Smith a new body plant is being added to the cars concern. Today in speaking of the improvement he said:

"Following recent completion of a vast construction program costing \$2,000,000, Dodge Brothers, Detroit, have broken ground for another huge eight-story building requiring an additional investment of \$1,500,000. In this new unit, 440,000 feet of floor space will be provided. It will be devoted largely to closed body work.

"The new principle of all-steel closed body construction developed by Dodge Brothers has generated a rapidly growing demand for this type of body. This new plant will provide much-needed space for assembly, enameling and storage of the all-steel closed bodies. Many large presses and enormous electrically heated enameling ovens will be installed, and warehousing space will be provided.

"The announcement of proposed increase of manufacturing facilities comes as a welcome one to Dodge Brothers dealers throughout the country, as the demand for cars has been far in advance of present production.

"The new construction project, on completion, will increase Dodge Brothers floor space to a total of 130 acres and will give employment to hundreds of additional workmen."

Mr. and Mrs. Turner Oliver, who are here from Spokane, were visitors in Wallowa county a part of the week.

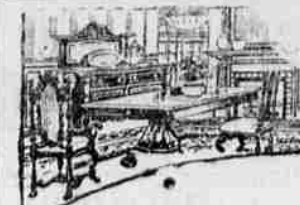
The Eastern Star Social Club will meet with Mrs. L. M. Hoyt Tuesday afternoon, September 19, at 2 p. m.
