KOREAN NOTES ARE NOW USED

(By Associated Press.)
TOKIO, Aug. 15. (By Mail).—The old Russian currency issued in the time of Antonov which has been in circulation since the independence of the Vladivostok government, is now gradually being replaced by counterfeit notes issued by the Bank of Korea according to a statement made by Mr. Shiro Hori, who is in charge of the Vladivostok branch office of the Bank of Korea.
Mr. Hori said that the withdrawal of Japanese troops from Siberia could not adversely affect the Vladivostok branch and denied reports that the branch office of the bank in Vladivostok would be closed simultaneously with the military evacuation. Economic conditions in Vladivostok, he said, are subject to fluctuation on account of the imminent military evacuation but any investments made up to be made would not suffer from the withdrawal of the troops.

JAP-CHINESE TRADE BOOM

TOKIO, Aug. 15. (By Mail).—The foreign trade of the Japanese Empire with the Chinese republic for the month of July resulted, according to the returns just published by the Finance Department, in an excess of export over import amounting to 10,348,000 yen, the former reaching 25,767,000 yen and the latter 15,419,000 yen.
The above brings the gross total of the trade since the beginning of the current year up to 1,963,580,000 yen for exports and 75,494,000 yen for imports, the former indicating an increase of 26,458,000 yen and the latter a decrease of 207,000 yen, with an excess of export over import amounting to 21,440,000 yen.

High School News

Happenings in and Around School Centers.
The first student body meeting of the year was held Wednesday afternoon. The meeting was held in the gymnasium and the purpose was to introduce the new officers and to get acquainted with the year's work.

The football coaches receive many cuts and bruises known as strawberries, from the condition of the field. It is hoped the students will give their help in support in improving the athletic equipment, thereby aiding their team in being victorious.

The high school has a good turnout for football. The first game will be between Imbler and the L. H. S. on September 30th.

The La Grande high school has always had a good enrollment record but it is better than ever this year, as our high school has more students enrolled than either Baker, Pendleton or The Dalles.

On account of the poor equipment of the football team the price of the student body tickets will be raised in order to obtain the money unless some better plan is brought up before the executive board.

An interesting lecture was given in the auditorium on the opening day of school by Attorney Geo. T. Cochran. Mr. Cochran gave the students much good advice, which not only was appreciated and remembered by many. His talk dealt mostly on concentration and education.

The football season is open now and the boys go out every night for practice. If more men would go out for practice and work like they do, we would be able to compete with the teams of Baker and Pendleton with a fair chance of winning.

The A. G. S. met for the first time this year. Beulah Smith, the president for the coming year, presided over the meeting. Miss Smith is desirous of having a better and more progressive A. G. S. than ever before, but states that she cannot do it without the co-operation of each of the girls. She explained the purpose of the A. G. S. for the benefit of the Freshmen girls. She wishes to become acquainted with each one individually so that she may be able to help them in any way. The coming year promises to be a successful one for the A. G. S.
