O. A. C. HEN LAYS 300 EGGS

CORVALLIS, Sept. 18.—A world record for White Leghorns may be made by a bird of Oregon Agricultural College stock, according to word received from Santa Cruz, Calif., where the farm bureau egg-laying competition is in progress. Alexander Stewart's White Leghorn hen number 38 had already laid her 300th egg up to the last of August, with a month to go.

Number 38 was bred from stock obtained from the college. Three years ago Mr. Stewart bought two sitting hens, from which were hatched 24 chicks. He raised 12 pullets and five cockerels from the hatch. The 12 pullets averaged 210 eggs each their first year, two birds laying more than 400 eggs in 21 months. Stewart obtained a male bird from the college in 1920 and another last year. From this stock he bred the pen that is leading the California contest, and hen number 38, a member of the pen, is now making such a remarkable record.

ARMISTICE DAY PLANS PROGRESS

Prizes to be Given for Best Representation and for Tallest and Shortest Ex-Service Man in Parade.

Plans are still progressing apace for the Armistice Day celebration to be held in La Grande on November 11 with the Union county American Legion posts uniting with the local post in making the day the biggest ever in local celebrations. The various committees are working hard on the project and the business men and Ad Club are co-operating with the post in an effort to put the celebration on the top in the biggest style possible.

Prizes to be Given.—The Ad Club has stated that they will give a \$40 post banner to the post outside of the La Grande post that appears in the parade with the most members in full uniform. A \$25 post banner will be given to the post, not including the local post, that has the biggest number of members in the parade, regardless of whether uniformed or not.

Clint Van Fleet has also announced that he will give a pair of army shoes to the tallest ex-service man and to the shortest ex-service man that appears in the parade, regardless of their address.

Applications for a charter for the Union county "40-s" society has been sent to headquarters recently and the local post is expecting the charter within a few days.

splendid results in a long series of curvature cases in children and urged that a movement be started to have the examination of the spine and feet included in the regular physical examinations now being made of the children in our public schools. It was pointed out that in this way many beginning cases of spinal curvature would be found that are now being overlooked and that by beginning osteopathic treatment early hundreds of little children would be saved from a lifetime of suffering and the deformity commonly called a "hunch back."

At the regular business meeting, in addition to the re-election of Dr. Ingle, Dr. Marshall of Salem was elected vice-president and Dr. Beaumont of Portland received the position of secretary and treasurer.

STUDENTS ARE BACK AT O. A. C.

CORVALLIS, Sept. 18.—The advance guard of students for the 1922-23 school year is already arriving and by Sunday evening hundreds of young men and women will fully pour into Corvallis by special trains. Registration will take place Monday and Tuesday and class work will start Wednesday.

Although registration is expected to be heavy, the housing committee under Professor H. T. Vance reports that rooms will be available for 4000 and that no student need stay away on account of fear of not finding accommodations. Erection of 200 new houses in Corvallis this season, together with the college dormitories and fraternities, sorority and club houses, assures plenty of rooms, according to Professor Vance.

Dodgers will be handed all students boarding trains at Portland, giving necessary information in regard to obtaining rooms and registration. Upper classmen will also be on hand to answer inquiries.
