MOVIES FEATURE OF EXPOSITION

(By Associated Press) RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 27. (By Mail).—The motion picture will play a role in the Brazilian Centennial Exposition unknown to former world fairs and expositions. After being exhibited in this capital, films showing every phase of Brazilian industrial, commercial, agricultural and civic life will start on a journey of education to other cities and towns throughout the entire country. An enormous number of films showing life in foreign lands will be exhibited here and in many of the other cities in Brazil.

It is the aim of the exposition officials not only to bring as many people as possible to the exposition but also to take the exposition to as many people as possible. The motion picture will be the means employed for both purposes.

BOY TRAMPS 4000 MILES

EUGENE, Sept. 19.—After a tramp of 4,000 miles during the past four months, Richard Slater, aged 16, who says his home is in Milwaukee, Wis., arrived in Eugene a few days ago. Last May, according to the boy's story, his father dared him to walk to the Pacific Coast. He took the dare and left home with only \$15.

He says that he traveled over the southern route to California and plans to return to Wisconsin by making a swing through Canada. Slater adds that he is no "bum" and is working his way. He says he is determined to show his father that he is made of sterner stuff than the parent believes. Slater claims to be a high school student.
