LA GRANDE MAN IN ACCIDENT.—BAKER, Sept. 20.—Suffering from bruises and possibly internal injuries from being thrown from a car, Miss Ethel Drew is in the St. Elizabeth hospital, and physicians state it is doubtful as to how badly she is injured. She was hurt in an auto accident Sunday afternoon, when the light bug in which she, in company with Verner Pundent and Miss Margaret Stoppelcamp, were riding was knocked over on its side by a heavier car passing it. Eye-witnesses of the accident state that the larger car was driven intentionally into the bug, which was far over on the right side of the road. The front wheel of the large car struck the front wheel of the bug, knocking the lighter car into a ditch.

Driving down the Baker-Haines highway in the bug the occupants noticed a car ahead of them and tried to pass it having no windshield on their car and striking the dust. The big car ahead slowed down a bit and the bug passed it after a few minutes' race. Staying at a distance of about a half mile ahead, the bug slowed down and took the right side of the road to let the big car pass. Then the accident happened, the driver of the big car, W. R. Leightner, of La Grande, swerved into the bug, knocking it over into a ditch.

The accident was witnessed by Traffic Officer Huggins and a number of passers-by. Just who will get the blame for the accident has not been determined.

CAMERA SURVEYS GREAT AREAS

(By Associated Press.)
CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—Photographic maps taken by a new camera used in airplanes make possible the surveying in a few hours of vast areas hitherto inaccessible, according to J. M. Mercer, editor for the Western Society of Engineers.

This camera, Mr. Mercer asserted, was developed by Maj. James W. Bagley because experiments made immediately after the World war showed inaccuracies in the method of aerial surveying then used. The camera has three lenses and a photographic transformer by means of which photographic maps can be made which will be exceedingly accurate," stated Mr. Mercer.

Recently an aerial survey was made of the city of New York," Mr. Mercer continued, "for use in connection with the location of certain important railroad and tunnel properties. The same maps were used by the zoning commission, and for such work they are invaluable.

"During the war, our air forces were an indispensable means of obtaining maps showing the most complete detail of enemy operations. The lessons learned in wartime are being put to good use."
