OREGON MUST HAVE PEOPLE SAYS BAKER

country an empire of its own. Mr. Hudson pointedly asked the question, "What are you going to do with your surplus?" He then told how the wheat, lumber and wool of the inland country necessarily goes through Portland to reach the market of the outside world. He also spoke of \$20,000,000 having been spent by Portland people on the Port of Portland. This money has been raised solely by that city.

One Lady Speaker.

There were twenty ladies with the delegation from the metropolis and among those ladies one was selected as the lady speaker for the program last night. She was Mrs. G. H. Frankel, head of the Federated Clubs of Portland. She spoke from the standpoint of the part the ladies of Oregon will take in the Exposition and told of her experience in the same capacity during the preparation of the St. Louis fair. Mrs. Frankel is a pleasing talker and made an excellent impression upon her audience.

of the mountains, and I wish from this platform to commend most heartily the members of the legislature who stood solidly opposed to the demand of Portland that Oregon should tax herself for a Portland fair.

"We come to you this evening however, with an entire new proposition asking you to vote in November for the constitutional amendment which permits Multnomah county to bond herself and tax her own property within her own borders for sufficient funds to pay for the 1925 exposition; plainly stated this means that the city of Portland will do all the work and pay all the expenses of the 1925 fair, and all that we are asking is the privilege of doing so.

"Bear in mind, my friends, in Eastern Oregon, that our state is far behind California and Washington and we believe this exposition to be of great benefit in bringing more people to Oregon. California has 22 people to the square mile, Washington 20 people to the square mile while Oregon has only eight people to the square mile. In Eastern Oregon there has been no increase in population to speak of in ten years. You are standing still—you are marking time. You must have more people on the lands in order for Eastern Oregon to go ahead and prosper. We have worlds of water power and worlds of water, a combination of which would

irrigate great quantities of the best lands in the entire nation. In order to have a greater Oregon, we must have a greater Oregon and in order to have a greater Oregon we must have more people."

The mayor called attention to the fact that he did not care whether he ever held another office in Oregon or not, and that the people had the right to recall him at any time, but his purpose was to tell the truth as he saw it, claiming that Portland would never fail to do its part in city and state affairs. There are obstructionists in Portland, he said, but they are the first to say when a project has been completed, "We did it."

In closing his remarks the Mayor said that Oregon as a state was not as progressive as a grass-hopper,

because a grass-hopper would move on when he had devoured everything in sight, while Oregon had been perfectly willing to live a contented life, and not reach out for progress.

Walter Jenkins Popular.

The meeting last evening closed with Walter Jenkins, the popular song leader of the state, singing the official Oregon song. Mr. Jenkins was at his best and his splendid voice and magnificent personality were a delight to the entire audience. Following the meeting in the church, La Grande people and their guests joined in a big community dance at Rex hall which lasted until 1:30 o'clock and at 2:30 o'clock this morning the special exposition train moved on to Pendleton.
