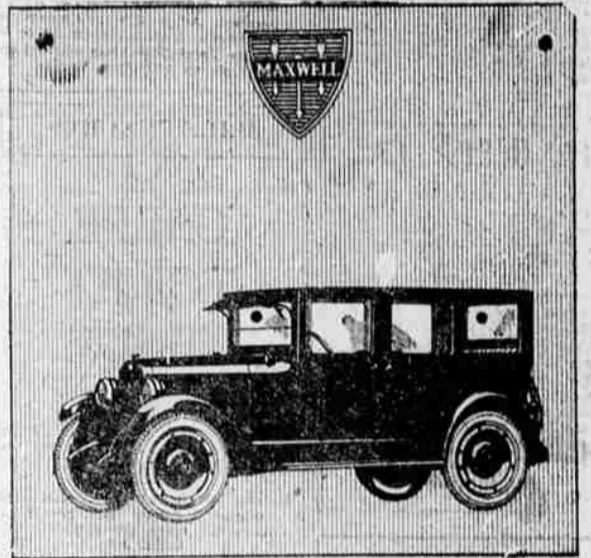

EMPLOYMENT IS AGAIN NORMAL

J. A. Kelly Points Out Normal Employment Conditions Throughout the Pacific Coast in His Official Report

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.

Normal employment conditions throughout the Pacific coast are noted by J. A. Kelly, San Francisco, district director of the employment service, United States Department of Labor, in his report for the month of August made public here today. Although there is a slight general surplus of clerical help, according to Mr. Kelly, demand for experienced agricultural, lumber and building workers exceeds the supply.

An abstract of Mr. Kelly's report on conditions in California, Oregon and Washington follows: "California—All branches of industry, excepting iron and steel and railroad repairs at normal or above. Demand for agricultural workers and fruit pickers has absorbed all surplus labor. Contractors are operating to capacity and affording considerable employment to female workers. There is a demand for experienced, permanent power coal-cutting workers.

"Oregon—Employment conditions have reached normal. Fishing, berry picking, canning, lumbering, logging, contracting and manufacturing are at high tide, demanding all surplus labor. A number of new industrial plants have been completed and more in course of erection. Fruit and hop harvest will demand more help than the local supply.

"Washington—Shortage of labor exists to a limited extent in coast logging camps, harvest fields, agricultural pursuits, building trades and in Alaska. There is a surplus of clerical help. Forest fires and transportation have caused temporary suspensions in several logging camps. Construction of buildings, highways, municipal improvements and dock facilities continue. All industries are practically normal. The fruit sections will require hundreds of outside workers beginning the middle of September."

Fine Medieval Buildings. There are many remains of Roman buildings in different parts of Europe. Their bricks are much smaller than ours, more like the modern (flat) in shape. The workers in England called them (as we have all heard of Wat Tyler) were probably brickmakers. Two fine examples of brick architecture in the England of medieval days are Hampton court and Lambeth palace London.

Potential Wealth for Argentina. All the plants cultivated in Europe for the sake of their woody oils will grow readily in some parts of Argentina and experiments show that they will give a yield of oil equal in quantity and quality to the European products.
