BANNER ELEVEN IS HOPED FOR

Graduate Manager Jack Benefiel Tells of Lemon Yellow Grid Prospects.

Jack W. Benefiel, UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 23.—If hard work and trying will develop a football team the University of Oregon will have a banner eleven this season, according to Coach "Shy" Huntington, and all Oregon fans who have given the lemon-yellow the "once over" agree with him.

With but three members of last year's eleven missing in the squad of more than 25 men who are now practicing daily for the varsity team this year's outlook is the best since 1916. Coach Huntington with Line Coach "Bart" Spellman and Trainer Bill Hayward started full practice Monday and each day sees the squad of varsity timber growing. Huntington, who is starting his fourth year as head coach, says this season is the first one he has experienced when all conditions have sized up for a good start.

Line Looks Good.
A survey of the line from end to end and a review of the backfield shows a wealth of material from which to pick this season. Inroads of graduation took "Spike" Leslie, Martin Howard and Bill Reinhardt from the eleven last year. For Leslie's place as tackle Huntington is grooming "Cogs" Campbell, a 200-pound home crusher who made an enviable reputation on the O. A. C. track eleven two years ago. Campbell registered in the University of Oregon last year and is eligible for this year's team.

George Bliss and Bill Spore, two stalwart ends, members of the Oregon track team will put up a hard battle for the end position last year, vacated by Howard and "Chappy" Chapman, who played quarter in a majority of last season's games. Back in the ranks this year, Floyd and "Tiny" Shields, tried and true guards of last year's season are coveting about on the turf each night now. "Tiny" suffered a severe case of pneumonia during the summer, but is now practically recovered and is expected to be a bulwark of strength in the line. Carl Vonderheide, a letterman of last year, looks as a likely tackle mate for Campbell. Vonderheide is a husky player and earned his spurs last season playing wonderful ball. Rodd Brown, two-year veteran at end, is back in the running again this season.

Fine Backfield.
The backfield bristles with good material. Besides Chapman, quarter, Huntington has Ward Johnson, George King, "Butch" Gram and "Frank" Latham of last year's team, as well as a flock of good prospects to choose from. Brum is being developed as the probable quarterback of the team and the lengthy Latham will be on the receiving plays. The aerial attack developed by Huntington last season with Latham reaching up and pulling down was one of the most effective bits of work Oregon fans have witnessed.

Chuck Parsons, husky utility man, adaptable to any position on the team is expected back shortly. "Prink" Callison, veteran center whose work in the Oregon-Harvard game will long be remembered, was injured during the summer when he lost his left and fractured knee bones in both legs. He is rapidly improving, however, and will report for practice soon, according to Huntington. He has an able understudy in the person of Horace Byler, a member of last year's squad.

Among the promising members of last year's freshman team who will have to be reckoned with are Art Sutton and Jens Terjeson, backfield men and Goedecke, linesman, "Razzy" Brown, letterman on the Knox eleven two years ago is eligible for a backfield position this season and has reported for practice.

Ray McKewen and Dick Reid, slightly limping of last year's varsity squad, are expected to report for full training in a day or so.

Oregon Schedule.
Oregon will open her schedule with a contest with the Pacific University team in Eugene, September 30, followed by a contest here with Multnomah amateur athletic club in October. Whitman will be met at Pendleton some time in October. Idaho at Portland. No game has been scheduled for November 4, in preparation for the annual Homecoming game which will be played here November 11 with Washington State college. The annual state classic with O. A. C. will be played in Corvallis November 18, and the scheduled season will close November 30 when Oregon plays the University of Washington at Seattle.

A new football field has been arranged, adjoining the varsity practice field for the freshman squad which will be formed and start active practice immediately after the opening of school October 2. "Baz" Williams, former Oregon star, will coach the freshman again this year.

SPOKANE HAS A FREAK FLOWER

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 23.—A sunflower freak has been grown by A. Gundersen, a local resident. The plant carries more than 75 blossoms, has branches like a tree and is more than 10 feet high. The stalk is about five inches in diameter at the base.

"The plant, a volunteer, had the appearance of any other sunflower, when it started this year," Mr. Gundersen said. "I watered it heavily and it grew exceptionally fine. It then began to branch out like a tree and sunflowers grew on many of the branches. There is one large cluster of sunflowers on the top and others are sprinkled thickly on the branches down to a point three feet above the ground."

"I have never seen a sunflower like this. Scores of people have seen it and they all say it is a freak."

George Detlaff, a resident of Five Mile Prairie, a suburb, has a plant growing on his place which he believes is even more unusual than the one of Mr. Gundersen's. Detlaff's sunflower is eight and one-half feet high and carries 178 blossoms. It is two and one-half inches thick at the base and is branched out like a tree. Some of the blossoms measure 10 inches across. "It is a dry land plant and never has been irrigated," said Mr. Detlaff. "If it had been watered, it probably would have been much larger."
