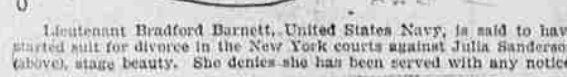

Prettiest Arms in France



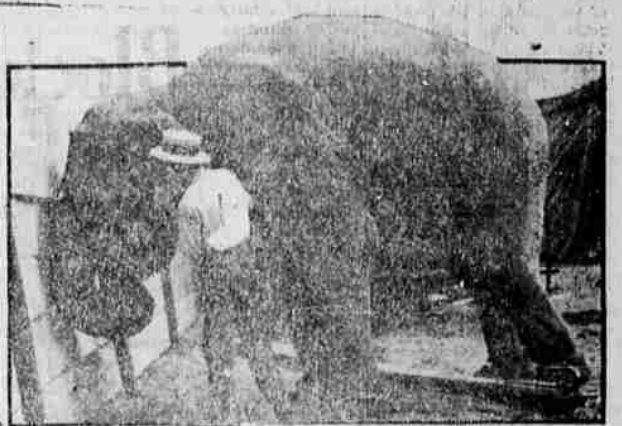

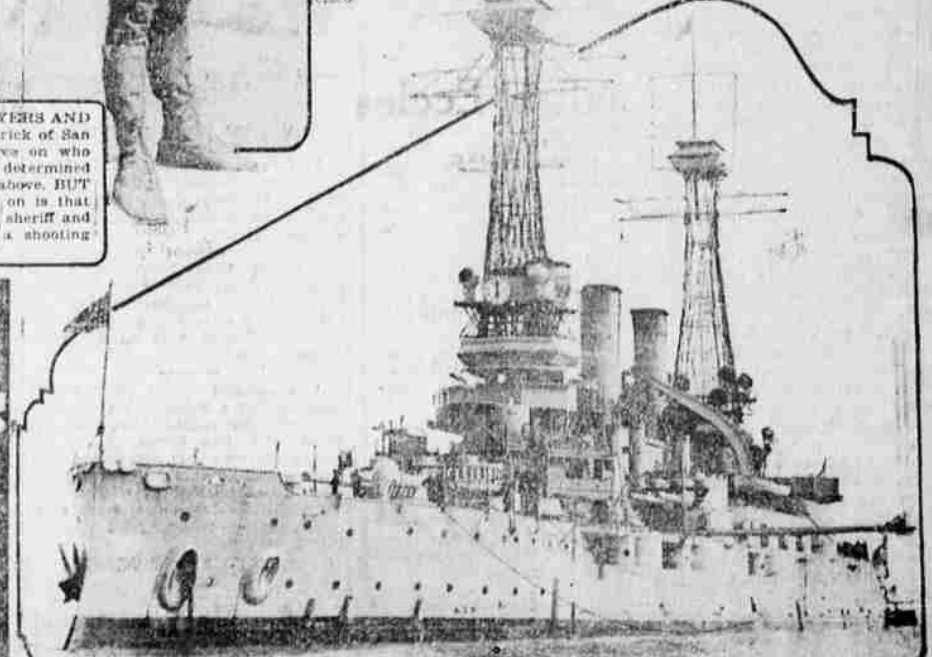
