VOLENDAM, Holland, Aug. 28.—(By Mail)—The people of this seaside village have two sources of income, fishing, and the tourist who come to see the medieval costumes of the villagers and comment on their adherence to old time customs. The men catch the one, and the girls the other. For Volendam has its belles and the old world attire of their forebears becomes them well.

BARBERS NEVER CUT A BEARD

LONDON, Sept. 4. (By Mail).—A reminder of the survival of the ancient trade guild London, long after their members have ceased to have any connection with trades they ostensibly represent, is provided by the election of Sir Samuel G. Sheard as chairman of the Company of Barbers for the ensuing year.

Sir Samuel never was a barber, and if any of his ancestors ever were he has forgotten it. And the same is true of all the members of the company. But they are very proud of the old traditions which the company once maintained, and met together on stated occasions to eat a generous dinner, washed down with good wine, and listen to the speeches about the good old times.

The company is an ancient one. It was incorporated in 1467, and 50 years later an act was passed which prevented any persons not members of the company from practicing surgery within seven miles of the city of London unless they had been licensed by the Bishop of London.

Barbers were versatile folk in those times, combining the advantages of surgeon and dentist with the work of trimming hair and beards.

DRUG DELIVERY IS UNIQUE

LONDON, Sept. 4. (By Mail).—Scotland Yard is conducting an intensive campaign against West End drug traffickers whose activities of late are said to have greatly increased. Some of the methods used in delivering drugs to the purchasers are described in a recent report.

"Fourth lamp post on the right," a trafficker whispers in the ear of a cocaine victim. He passes down the street, and with the aid of glowing lanterns a little white packet on the fourth lamp post. The purchaser follows at a discreet distance and removes the packet.

Another trafficker drops folded mibus tickets on the pavement. He is followed by a string of clients who pick up the tickets.

High of course contains cocaine.

Another throws an apparently empty match box into the gutter.

Minute or so later a customer calls it up and extracts one or more bits of cocaine.

Another trafficker keeps the drug in the turn-up ends of his trousers. He advises his customers where he will walk, and as he goes along he stops as if to fasten his boot-
