RUINED WALLS TO BE REBUILT

(By Associated Press.)
SALONIKI, Greece, Sept. 2.—(By Mail)—Saloniki, whose crumbled and buckened walls have been one of the excruciating sights of the world for five years, is at last to be rebuilt. A corporation has been formed with a capital of 10,000,000 francs for the reconstruction of these parts of the city which were destroyed in the great fire of 1917.

Half this sum has been subscribed by the National Bank of Greece, three and a half million by Jewish capitalists, and the remainder by Saloniki Greeks.
