OREGON LABOR IN SESSION

SALEM, Or., Sept. 26.—That the Russian code have invaded the United States and are making a determined effort to gain control of the labor movement here was the assertion that caused considerable discussion at the opening session of the annual convention of the Oregon State Federation of Labor here yesterday.

One of the delegates (by request) submitted a number of resolutions which urged the federation to sponsor the Industrial Workers of the World and red programmes.

This assertion, although probably motivated by referring the resolution to a committee for investigation, caused Otto Hartwig, president of the federation, to denounce it as a labor circles as undesirable. He declared that those inciting should be ousted from the labor ranks as quickly as possible.

Industrial Unionism, the one central unionism, is the one

big un-idea, and the affiliation of organized labor with any partisan political party came in for a trouncing by C. O. Young, delegate to Oregon from the Washington federation of labor. The speaker accused Attorney-General Daugherty of being controlled by the open-shop element and assailed the injunction issued against the striking railroad shopmen.

Mr. Young lauded the Oregon federation for its sane management, which he said probably was responsible for the harmony that prevails in labor circles in this state.

Other speakers at today's sessions of the convention included O. P. Hoff, state treasurer; Otto Hartwig, president of the federation; George Halverson, mayor of Baker; W. H. Fitzgerald, deputy labor commissioner, and Governor Olcott.

Careful Study is Needed.
Mr. Hartwig in his keynote address declared that never before has the labor movement been called upon for a more careful study of conditions, and a more sincere effort to help solve national struggles than at the present time. He counseled sane management of labor affairs and indicated that conservatism rather than radicalism would win success for the workers.

Mr. Fitzgerald, in his address, took occasion to rap employment offices which charge fees for providing jobs. He cited a number of instances wherein he alleged labor had received the short end of the deal.

Organized Bodies Blamed.
Mr. Fitzgerald blamed organized bodies for creating a great deal of their own troubles, which are due, he said, to their failure to pry into the statistics of their employers before striking or asking wage increases.

Governor Olcott expressed himself as heartily in sympathy with the labor movement in Oregon and pledged his continued efforts in its behalf. He gave a brief review of his official relations with union organizations and commended the delegates who had been sent to confer with him for their cooperation and assistance in bringing about amicable settlements in all cases involved.

Resolutions are Introduced.
During the afternoon a large number of resolutions were introduced and were referred to committees for investigation. These resolutions follow:

That the Volstead law be amended to permit the manufacture and sale of wholesome beer and light wines.

That the government accept Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals.

That the ship subsidy now before congress be rejected in its present form and that it be changed, making it compulsory for American ships to employ American sailors instead of Orientals, and also that all contracts for the vessels be made in this country and not abroad, as is now the custom.

Fire Prevention Favored.
That the convention endorse fire prevention week and that October 9 be set aside as fire prevention day.

That the per capita tax of the federation be reduced 1 per cent and that 2 per cent a month be set aside for a strike fund.

That the Oregon federation of labor endorse the general idea of organization by industry.

That an effort be made to include waitresses in the law calling for a six-day week for women.

That the organization set aside a sum of money and approve a general plan to send propaganda to all foreign countries, acquainting foreigners with the true labor conditions in this country, with a view of keeping unneeded laborers at home and saving them the expense of coming here when there is no work for them.

That the convention endorse affiliation with the red trade union international organized in Russia.

That capitalism must go for a scientific system of production and introduction of an industrial workers republic.

That greetings and felicitations be sent to the workers of Russia.

That a working class political action be taken to suppress the powers of the government regularly used against organized labor.

Carpenter Offers Four.
The last four resolutions were offered by C. A. Peterson of the Carpenters' union of Portland, who explained that he was requested to submit them by members of the organization. He said that personally he did not approve of their adoption.

It was said tonight that none of the resolutions would be reported back to the convention before Wednesday. Tomorrow the delegates will go to Corvallis where a business session will be held in the morning. In the afternoon the delegates will inspect the Oregon Agricultural college.

The federation delegates will be entertained at the state fair on Wednesday afternoon, and adjournment probably will not be taken before Friday.
