THEATRES

"THE STORM" AT SHERRYS
"The Storm" says a famous New York Critic, "Sets new pace in movie picture thrills."
Setting a new pace for the screen in realism and downright thrills in the same manner the original production did upon the legitimate stage. In many respects this Universal-Jewel presentation surpasses the stage version, notably in the storm and fire scenes where miles of exteriors offered a greater opportunity to Director Desmond Barker than were at the disposal of George Broadhurst.

Adapted from the play which packed New York theaters for months, the screen version follows Langdon McCormick's script faithfully. House Peters plays the part of Burr, the primitive frontiersman, in a manner that reaches new heights of screen artistry. Virginia Valli, as the French-Canadian girl, who causes Burr and his English lawyer friend—interpreted by Matt Moore—to break a fast friendship, does the finest work of her career.

A column or more of confounding could be written about the storm and fire scenes in this production. Imagine two men, deadly enemies, and the girl both men love, trapped in a mountain pass with the woods on all sides a roaring furnace, a flaming death trap. Could any more vital test be planned to prove the mettle of each man, to show which was the real man, and which was the coward? So realistic is the scene that one can almost feel the scolding heat. One air spell-bound as the first red glare of the fire, miles away, creeps nearer and nearer, and in the rush of the gale one can see the sparks leaping from tree to tree, see the flames driving forward relentlessly. The broken black trees become pillars of fire. Giant pines fall with a crash, then the flames pass—leaving an aftermath which will take Mother Earth ages to restore.

Matt Moore's interpretation of the part of the sly, tricky, and cowardly English lawyer is an admirable foil to the simple honesty and courage of House Peters' character of woodman and hero. After seeing the screen version one cannot be surprised at the remarkable attendance records the show has put up in New York and other large cities where it appeared.

In addition to the three principal players, great credit is due Janet Swickard, Frank Lanning, and Gordon McGee for their work in the chief supporting roles.

Increasing Capacity of Independence Mill.

BAKERT, Sept. 26.—Active work started at the Independence Mill near Grande to enlarge the mill plant. In the mountain mill is closed after a continuous run of several weeks. The mill recently reopened this summer after having been closed for two years.
The success with the mill during the time it was in operation was such as to demonstrate the ability to enlarging the mill plant. The enlargement will be in the direction of increasing capacity of the plant. The plant has been running day and night, treating 25 tons of ore a day. The improvements being made will triple the tonnage to be handled.
The work is being rushed as rapidly as possible.

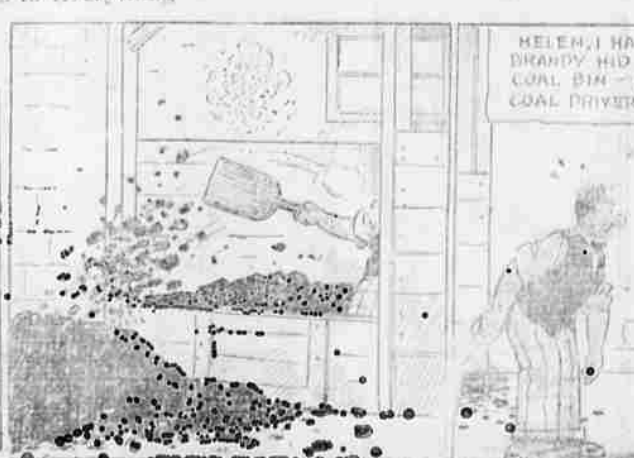
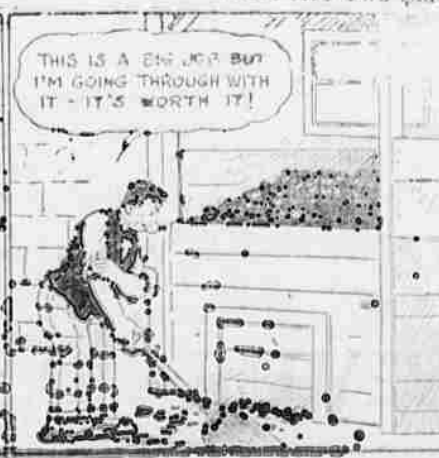
