LEBANON HILLS
RECORDS LAST

Stone Carving on Lebanon Hills Has Endured for Over 3000 Years.

(By Associated Press.)
JERUSALEM, Sept. 1. (By Mail).—On the face of a cliff in the Lebanon hills, 10 miles from the city of Beirut, in Syria, a strip of country lying between the Lebanon and Euphrates has been the bridge between the ancient empires of the Valley of the Nile and Mesopotamia, and over it has passed the armies of the ancient, medieval and modern worlds. The narrowest point is where the Lebanon mountain comes close to the sea, and at this place, 10 miles from the city of Beirut, a tablet setting forth his conquest of the land. The figures of the ancient Egyptian ruler and his men still are visible. A few feet away one may see, carved in the same rock by a British stone carver, a record of the coming in September, 1918, of Field Marshall Sir Edmund H. H. Allenby, G. C. B., commander of the allied forces in Asia Minor. And the passage of the centuries from B. C. 1500 to A. D. 1815, is recorded by various other carvings, in all not less than 12 and each describing the march of a victorious army.

The cliff selected for the carving of these historic records is at the mouth of the Beq river, 10 miles northeast of Beirut, in Syria. This strip of country lying between the Lebanon and Euphrates has been the bridge between the ancient empires of the Valley of the Nile and Mesopotamia, and over it has passed the armies of the ancient, medieval and modern worlds. The narrowest point is where the Lebanon mountain comes close to the sea, and at this place, 10 miles from the city of Beirut, a tablet setting forth his conquest of the land. The figures of the ancient Egyptian ruler and his men still are visible. A few feet away one may see, carved in the same rock by a British stone carver, a record of the coming in September, 1918, of Field Marshall Sir Edmund H. H. Allenby, G. C. B., commander of the allied forces in Asia Minor. And the passage of the centuries from B. C. 1500 to A. D. 1815, is recorded by various other carvings, in all not less than 12 and each describing the march of a victorious army.

Several American conquerors led their armies through this pass, including the great Semmehch, who threatened Jerusalem, but whose army was smitten by "the breath of the Lord," and for a century had a quarter the city was saved from its foes.

Alexander the Great led his conquering host through this pass on his way to Egypt, and Greek and Latin tablets tell of the conquests of the great kingdoms of southern Europe when the march of empire passed from Asia to Europe.

Coming down to recent history a tablet tells of the coming of the army of Louis Napoleon in 1869, when the massacres in the Lebanon were called for European intervention and France first set her foot in Asia. Nearly 60 years passed by, and then the English army led by General Allenby and assisted by the French swept up like a whirlwind from the south four years ago and ended the rule of the Turk in the southern part of Levant.

RUSSIA IS A
QUIET LAND

Russia Seems Land of Quiet Compared to Outside World, Says Newspaper.

MOSCOW, Sept. 1. (By Mail).—American and western European newspapers' correspondents who have been in Moscow during the period of the railway and coal mine strikes in the United States; the renewed fighting in Ireland; the political crisis in Italy; and the troubles in Germany incidental to the fall in the value of the mark, reached the conclusion that Soviet Russia was the most tranquil country in the world.

Under the iron hand of the proletarian dictatorship, strikes and disturbances such as the cables reported daily from abroad are impossible in Russia. So, while their colleagues in other countries were actively engaged in reporting wars, strikes and near-revolutionary demonstrations, the Moscow correspondents found little or nothing to do. The court trials and death sentences on the counter-revolutionists seemed mild in comparison with the news coming into Russia.

This tranquility was particularly surprising to the first French newspaper correspondents visiting Russia since the early days of the revolution. American newspapers for more than a year have had direct relations with Russia, but the French press has obtained its news of Russia by way of the "grapevine" route, printing obvious fabrications indicating that bloodshed and horrors were continuous performances in every Russian city, even up to this day.

One French correspondent was so surprised to find Moscow calm and even attaining the gaiety of a metropolis—with brilliant cafes, crowded race courses and flower-bedecked parks and plazas full of smiling and well-dressed promenaders—that he feared his Parisian readers, accustomed to a different brand of Russian news, would not believe what he wrote.

MISS THOMAS DEAD.

Former La Grande Family Suddenly Bereaved.

A. Thomas of Salt Lake, Utah, passed through La Grande last evening enroute to Portland in response to a message stating that his little 13 year old daughter, Stella Mae, had died suddenly of heart trouble. Three weeks ago, Mrs. Thomas and her two daughters, Lucille and Stella Mae, went to Portland, thinking the change of climate would be beneficial to Stella Mae who had been in ill health for some time, but she passed away Monday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas are well known in La Grande, this having been their home until eight years ago. Mr. Thomas was connected with the Amalgamated-Sugar company for several years, and was superintendent of the sugar mill here and also at Logan, Burley, and Twin Falls. Later he was general manager of the Idaho mills.

He is now manager of the Sugar works of the Wrigley Gum company of Salt Lake. Mrs. Thomas is a daughter of Mrs. E. W. Oliver, who is now living in Portland. They will arrive in La Grande Friday morning, and the funeral services will be held in the L. D. S. Tabernacle the same afternoon at 2 o'clock.
