LA GRANDERS AT PROVO

Bessie Andrew and Leland Killpack Matriculate at Utah School.

PROVO, Sept. 28.—The registration of students at the Brigham Young University last week proved to be the largest for this season ever known. In addition to its being especially heavy, the representation was the most complete of any year in the history of the school. More than 100 towns, 9 states, and two foreign countries were represented. Among the number were two from La Grande, Bessie Andrew and Leland Killpack.

According to President Harris, the enrollment is exceptionally gratifying for the reason that it indicates that the Brigham Young University is serving the whole intermountain country and other vicinities as it is intended that it should do. "This year," said he, "we are serving the entire intermountain empire from Canada on the north to Mexico on the south, and in addition we are serving many of the missions as we have registered here a number of people who have come to Utah for educational purposes. In return for the confidence thus placed in us, we hope to send out young men and women trained in secular things, possessing characters that will recommend them everywhere."
