FORD CARAVAN
ARRIVES SOON

Although the celebrated Ford Caravan, composed of 26 trucks and tractors and over one hundred pieces of equipment, was scheduled to arrive in La Grande next week, it was found necessary to postpone the arrival for several days. The exact date when the caravan will arrive has not been announced but will probably be in about two weeks.

An extensive program has been arranged by the local Ford dealers and the people of La Grande are looking forward to an educational feature that will be of importance. The program of the demonstration is in reality a "power exposition" and many other details that go to make up a program of considerable merit are being completed.

It is stated that the cost of the caravan is over \$100,000, which clearly indicates the magnitude of the series of demonstrations to be held. Fifty men are employed in its operation and no charges are made for any part of the exposition. Power farming apparatus, building implements, road building machinery, power driven household utilities, dump bodies and commercial bodies are included as a part of the equipment.

One of the most interesting features of the program will be a radio and motion picture outfit accompanied by the Mt. Angel Jazz Orchestra.

IMBLER GAME
TO BE PLAYED
ON SATURDAY

The gridiron game in La Grande will get their first chance of the season Saturday to see the 1922 Blue and White team in action when they will attempt to turn back the football invasion that is due to arrive from Imbler. The thrill of the playing, the crash of bodies, thrilling end runs and the suspense of seeing a forward pass start high and straight towards its objective point will again become a part of actual things in the life of the local sport followers—in other words the football season will be ushered in with a bang Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock on the high school field. Imbler is coming to La Grande with a team reputed to be dangerous. Five lettermen from last year, most of them backs, form the nucleus of an aggregation that Imbler high school has high hopes for. Last year the Imbler team showed promise and they may be able to deliver a high class package of explosive this year.

On the other hand, the local footballers are confident of victory, although expecting a real battle. Steady training, night after night, under "Skeet" Reynolds has been slowly welding them into a team that is only handicapped by having a lighter line than is wished for. But even that will be partly remedied soon as "Buck" Abbott, captain of the team, will return to school next week and will be used as either a tackle or an end. "Ditch" is an all Eastern Oregon tackle.

Positions Named.

Straight football will probably be resorted to in the coming contest and the relative strength of the local team will be ascertained at this time. Snapper or Bean will cover the ball and will be flanked by H. Garrity, Kere, Hunsbeldt or Bean. Tackles will be picked from Hart, G. McKeel and McFarland and the position of end will be taken by Beardsen, Holsland, O. Deen, Webb or Williams.

In the backfield Ray Lynch will probably look out the signals and Larson, Sherwood, G. Garrity, E. McKeel and Hunsbeldt will be the other backfield men. Jacobson, Garrick, Zimmerman and Kraus all will be in uniform awaiting the first call to get into the fray. Schedule Completed.

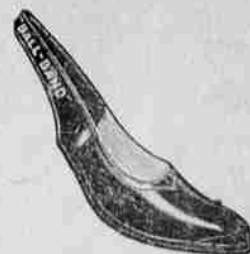
