"School Days" Thrills Large Audience of Screen Fans.

Every mother who has boys, every man who remembers his boyhood, will recall some delightful memories after seeing Wesley Barry in the Warner Brothers production of "School Days," which begins a three-day engagement at the Arcade Theatre today.

The picture reveals all the pranks of the mischievous boy, and the story of an untamable, irresponsible boy, Speck Brown, played by the trouble-faced star. And Speck fairly revels in his portrayal. The supporting cast is a large one and it includes Francis X.
