parent to educate his own child in whatever way and whatever faith he chooses is paramount to the right of the state, being a natural and inalienable right, conferred upon every man by virtue of the sacred duties and responsibilities of parenthood. So long as the private schools pursue substantially the same course

of instruction that is prescribed in the state schools, every parent in the state, and in every state, has an inalienable right to educate his child in any system of religion and morality that he pleases, and this law would utterly destroy the most vital and fundamental principle of American government."

Among other items that Mr. Wooten discussed in connection with the bill was his statement that of the supposed 50,000 signatures that the petition circulated throughout the state had contained, there were really only about 26,000. Of these 26,000, however, he stated, only a little over 12,000 were legally eligible to sign the petition under the laws of the state. "And of these 12,000 people, I know several of them personally who state that they were induced to put their names to the petition through misrepresentation and that they were not in accord with the vital thoughts of the bill."

OREGON "U"
TERM NEAR

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 28.—With the opening of the fall term of the University of Oregon a week away, executive officers and faculty are completing preparations for the registration of new and old students.

Credentialed of 340 students who are entering the university for the first time have been received and approved. At this time a year ago, 879 students had presented their credentials for approval.

To enter the University of Oregon a student must have as the minimum, fifteen acceptable high school units, ten of which must be in English, mathematics, foreign languages, science and history. The remaining five are elective. This entrance requirement is strictly enforced.

Every freshman is required to be in Eugene next Saturday in order that he or she may take the usual examination in English. The result of the examination does not affect a student's admission to the University, but will determine whether the freshman is to take certain work in English this fall. The examination will be held in Villard hall on the campus.

Registration days are next Monday and Tuesday. All university work begins Wednesday, October 4. Thursday, October 5, is the last day in the term for filing undergraduate cards. Credentials of entering students should already be in the hands of the registrar. Special arrangements have been made, however, to receive credentials this week, but the student may have to suffer some penalty in the way of delay because of filing entrance requirements later than two weeks in advance of registration.

Of the 340 students whose credentials have been approved, 577 are recent graduates of schools in the state. One hundred and fifty-seven prospective freshmen are from communities outside of Oregon.

Oregon students with advanced standing who will enter the university for the first time next week number ninety-three, according to Registrar Carlton E. Spencer. In the 1921-22 college year, 2,241 students were enrolled during the year at Eugene. One hundred and fifty-four were students in the School of Medicine at Portland; 1,284 took extension courses in Portland; 1,320 availed themselves of work in the correspondence study departments; 110 were specialists in the School of Music; and 860 enrolled in the summer schools at Eugene and Portland. The total enrollment was 5,949 in all departments of the university.

ENGLAND HAS PROFITED

LONDON, Sept. 28.—Constantine's abdication again making possible cooperation between Lloyd George and Venizelos may cause a lightning change in Great Britain's policy toward the Turks. With Constantine out of the way there is a chance of reorganizing the best forces of Greece.

The Greek revolutionists were reported not only pro-Venizelos but also pro-ally.

800 TOMMIES
IN HOSPITAL

LONDON, Sept. 28.—Although it is nearly four years since fighting in the great war ceased, there are still some 800 patients in a special surgery hospital in London with wounds that refuse to heal.

Operations have been conducted quickly, but without permanent success. Nearly all the cases are those of foot soldiers of some kind or another, and a large staff of surgeons and nurses is kept busy. Many of the present patients have been at work, but they returned to the hospital for attention because of a wound which had become infected. Some of the wounds are on the legs, and these have to be removed but this causes trouble in another limb.

TRAIN KILLS TRUCK DRIVER

CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 27.—"And that is all there is to it," said Blane Hunsaker, employee of the Ohio state highway commission, as he lit a cigarette and walked away.

In 20 minutes the remains of what was once a five-ton automobile truck was cleared from the Pennsylvania tracks and the New York street proceeded on its way.

"Some persons are born lucky," mused the employee. "Here is a fellow who took a truck, hit by a train going 50 miles an hour, and not a scratch."

The motor truck, which Hunsaker was driving, was hit by the train when it crossed the tracks. The engine on the truck was thrown more than 200 feet and the truck, filled with gravel, was crushed in a half minute, while the driver made frantic efforts to stop the train.

Instead of finding Hunsaker's body as expected, the train crew found him on the tracks, the engine of the train, unscathed.

"Perhaps for the first time, old top," said Hunsaker, as passengers and train crew looked on.
