M'GULLY STORE HAS A CHANGE

ENTERPRISE, Sept. 20.—By a change in the stockholders of the McCully Mercantile company of Joseph, H. S. Gibson and Charles F. Johnson become equal owners with John E. Himelewright, whose father, S. C. Himelewright and brother, Fred C. Himelewright, retire from the corporation. John Himelewright first bought the stock held by his father and brother, and then divided all his shares into three equal parts, between himself and Mr. Gibson and Mr. Johnson. The three own a majority of the stock of the company.
