At present she is greatly improved but will not return to La Grande until next year. She will spend the winter with her relatives and friends in Erie. 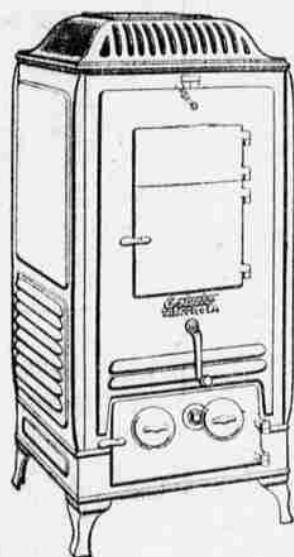
