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EUROPE MUST RECEIVE AID FROM AMERICA

Dr. Henry Chandler, Economist, Gives His Conclusion on Subject.

DEADLOCK REMAINS FIRM IN OLD WORLD

Germany Cannot Get Upon Her Feet Without a Respite and France Must Have Assistance.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—There appears on the horizon no other adequate source of help but the United States if Europe is to be brought back to a healthy condition within the near future, Dr. Henry A. Chandler, economist of the National Bureau of Commerce, in New York, declares.

"During the four years that have elapsed since the Armistice closed the Great War there has always existed a deadlock which in some ways has become harder and harder with each successive month.

"The deadlock is two-fold in nature. On the one hand, a series of economic conditions and inter-governmental financial obligations arising out of the war have forced governments into financial practices which make it impossible for them to have sufficient force to prevent the restoration of the productive power of some of the principal nations of Europe.

"On the other hand, there is a deadlock in international opinion which in many ways is the more difficult to solve. The latter arises chiefly from the inability of the nations to understand the insurmountable difficulties in each other's problems.

Germany Must Be Aided.

"The fact is that there exists in France as in Germany a very complicated and difficult condition of affairs. Just as it appears impossible for Germany to get on her feet without a respite, so it appears impossible for France, without reparations or financial help from other countries, to meet the obligations that face her. SHOPCRAFTS AND ROADS SETTLING

Agreement has Been Reached with Eighty-three Railroads, it is Stated.

(By Associated Press.)

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—Eighty-three railroads of the United States operating approximately 65,000 miles of line and employing between 125,000 and 130,000 members of the federated shop crafts, have settled the shop crafts strike with their system federations, according to a special bulletin sent yesterday to all members of the organization over the signature of B. M. Jewell, president. The latest additions to the settling roads were the Fort Smith & Western, the Georgia, Florida and Alabama, and the Chicago Great Western.

Replying to numerous requests for an interpretation of the Baltimore plan upon which the strike leaders alleged the settlements have been made, the circular stated that three reasons actuated the executives in accepting this agreement.

Executives Are Split.

It gives, first, a split in the Association of Railway Executives—one group amenable to a settlement and the other bent on destroying these organizations; second, willingness of the liberal group to negotiate national agreements and lay down a basis for settlements on other roads; third, that no justification could be found for keeping 125,000 men on strike who could return to work and assist in financing those who remained idle.

Justification for the action of the policy committee, the circular declared, is seen in the fact that 21 other carriers, in addition to the original 22, have agreed to the Baltimore plan. A second special circular to the membership contained in detail an interpretation of Federal Judge Wilkerson's decision on the injunction bill filed against the organization by Attorney General Daugherty.

It was supplied by Donald R. Richberg, attorney for the shop crafts.

Union Right Outlined.

"We cannot interpret the temporary injunction, drastic as its terms are," said Mr. Richberg's opinion in part, "as in any way restraining or preventing the officers and other representatives of the shop crafts organizations from doing all in their power to maintain an orderly discipline and conduct of the lawful work of the organizations, to continue to call for and to expect to receive the loyal support of each and every member and to continue to work in harmony and with a common lawful purpose to advance the common interests of the organized shop craft employees."

Mr. Jewell, accompanied by Mr. Richberg, arrived today from Washington, where they conferred with Attorney-General Daugherty regarding the submission of Judge Wilkerson's decision to a higher court for review. Attorney-General Daugherty assured them of his co-operation inasmuch as it is possible for him to act.

GREECE MUCH CONCERNED IN SETTLEMENT

Allied and Turkish Delegates Agreement Spurned in Athens.

APPEAL TO UNCLE SAM FOR JUSTICE

Thrace is Chief Subject for Consideration at the Mudania Conference on Today.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 5.—The Mudania conference reconvened today with Thrace the chief subject of consideration. The attitude of the Greek delegates on this question is declared to be giving the conference considerable concern.

Greeks Not Satisfied.

SMYRNA, Oct. 5.—Greek delegates expressed dissatisfaction with the agreement between the allied and Turkish delegates, according to messages from Mudania. Greeks declared themselves unauthorized to reply and that they must have instructions from Athens.

Consternation at Athens.

(By Associated Press.)

ATHENS, Oct. 5.—Consternation was caused here by reports from Mudania that the allies agreed to occupation of Eastern Thrace to the allied forces and Turkish gendarmes up to the line of the river Maritza, and evacuation of the province within ten days by the Greeks, failing of which the allied fleets would blockade Greece.

Officials are understood to be considering an appeal to the United States for assistance in obtaining a just solution to the Thracian question.

May Yet File For City Commission; Humphreys May Run; Closes Friday

"The time in which candidates may file their petitions for city commission is not yet closed," announced Attorney H. J. Green today to the La Grande Evening Observer.

"Although it was generally understood that Saturday evening at five o'clock, September 29, was the closing hour, this was not the case, as according to the Oregon laws, petitions must be certified in the county recorder's office not more than 60 days nor less than 25 days preliminary to the date of the state and city election, which falls upon the same day. The closing hour that petitions may be filed for candidacy for city commission is Friday evening at five o'clock, October 6." Mr. Green was out of town last week and failed to notice the misunderstanding that prevailed.

Throughout the city of La Grande and among those who were contemplating candidacy for the city commission, it was generally understood that September 30 at five o'clock was the last available date when one might enter his nomination for city commission.

J. E. Stearns, city recorder, today stated to a reporter on the Observer, "I said that all petitions for city commission ought to be filed with me not later than Saturday evening on September 30. By causing the candidates to file their petitions early it gives us a chance to attend to the certification, enabling us to get the nominations into the county recorder's hands by the required time." He further said today that nominations may be entered until tomorrow evening at five o'clock.

"In the past it was a common occurrence for the candidates to bring in their petitions at the latest hour, compelling us to work overtime in order to attend to the certification," said Mr. Stearns. By hurrying them up

CALIFORNIA FIGHTS THE JAP PEOPLE

Brief Filed Contending Yellow Man has No Rights in This Country.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—The state of California through Attorney General Webb and Deputy Attorney General English, filed in the supreme court today a brief in the Japanese naturalization case in which argument was concluded yesterday.

The brief supports the contention that Japanese are not of the Caucasian race and therefore are excluded from citizenship by statutory provisions restricting naturalization to aliens who are "free white persons," or those of African descent.

Stoddard and Grandy Resign From Commission Dr. Brown is Chosen

Things happened fast last evening when President W. D. Grandy called the city commission to order for business.

Commissioner David L. Stoddard, who has removed to Walla Walla, resigned his office to take effect at once. After accepting the resignation, President Grandy nominated Dr. H. S. Brown to fill the Stoddard term of office and he was elected.

Calling Commissioner Williams to the chair President Grandy tendered his resignation as city commissioner, explaining that his health is such he can no longer attend to the city business. He stated that he should have resigned before in justice to himself but he was desirous of helping in several unfinished matters.

With considerable regret the commission accepted Mr. Grandy's resignation and speeches were made praising the retiring commissioner for his long service and careful work which has had much to do with keeping La Grande financially sound.

R. J. Green Speaks.

City Attorney R. J. Green told in a brief but concise and impressive manner the connection of Mr. Grandy to city work and gave him proper credit for having done his duty at all times and also having kept his hand firmly upon the expenditures of the city.

"We are today reaping the good that Mr. Grandy has materially assisted in bringing about," said Mr. Green. "While others, cities in Oregon face tremendous taxes and heavy indebtedness, La Grande may have reasonably heavy taxes, but her indebtedness is nil due to the careful work of the commission with Mr. Grandy at its head. I regret that it becomes necessary for Mr. Grandy to give up his post of duty and I believe this community as a whole regrets
