

IDAHO TO HAVE NEW BUILDINGS

Business Men of Moscow
Urge Building of Two
New Dormitories at Uni-
versity of Idaho.

(By the Associated Press.)
MOSCOW, Oct. 5.—Financial
members of the board of trustees of the University of Idaho,
here, today, urged the building of two new
dormitories for the students of the university.
One of the proposed dormitories will
be for women. It is proposed to erect
this one so that it will be available
for use before the present one is
completed. It is planned to build
the other dormitory which will be for
men, during the summer of 1923. Each
building will cost approximately \$100,
000.

To secure the erection of the two
new buildings, business men have
organized the construction of the Uni-
versity of Idaho Building association.
This association is organized with bond
holders to front bonds in order the
greater part of the cost of the build-
ings, which will be paid to the uni-
versity.

It is planned that each building will
pay the interest on the bonds and will
in time, receive the bonds and purchase
the buildings for the university.
The association has been organized by
A. H. Gibson, of the university, and
has been elected as follows: President,
A. H. Gibson; vice president, J. H. Gibson;
secretary, J. H. Gibson; treasurer, J. H. Gibson.

"This group will continue to at-
least four or five years. If we will
make it possible by providing a plan
for these students to live."

It is expected the first building will
be on the corner of Main and
Second streets. The second building
will be on the corner of Main and
Third streets. The plan is to have
the first building completed by the
summer of 1923 and the second by
the summer of 1924.

DOG FISH OIL IS POPULAR

(By the Associated Press.)
VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 5.—Main-
facture of dog fish oil on a large scale
is planned by British Columbia in-
terests, according to a recent report to
the parliamentary fisheries commis-
sion by A. T. Hankey, minister of
fisheries.

Mr. Hankey stated that it would be
necessary to use fish traps to make the
catches in paying quantities and con-
sidered it advisable to ascertain the
attitude of the commission regarding
the use of traps before starting opera-
tions. The salmon industry in north-
west waters has suffered considerably
from the use of traps and at present
there are in great disfavor with gov-
ernmental authorities, say local fish-
ermen.

According to Mr. Hankey, all ar-
rangements have been made and if
permission is given for the use of the
traps the new industry will commence
operations on the Queen Charlotte Is-
lands, an adequate inlet, with one
plant, employing about 200 men.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—The enormous
increase of cigarette smoking among
women, says the medical corres-
pondent of the London Times, calls
for some protest by the medical pro-
fession. He declares the habit in

pleasure and becoming a vice.

"The absorption of nicotine,
which is the danger element in the
matter," the correspondent pro-
ceeds, "produces a condition of nerv-
ous distress which is frequently
painful to observe. From this pro-
cess palpitations and exhaustion and
outbursts of emotion. Woman's deli-
cate nervous organism was certainly
not intended to endure large
doses of this poison. Her functions
as a mother cannot but be inter-
fered with when she indulges in it
to excess."

Forty years ago this month the first Electric Central
Station in the United States began operation. The entire
system was designed by Thomas A. Edison and was in-
stalled under his personal supervision.

It served a territory of about one-sixth square mile of
territory. Today there are nearly 5700 operating companies
supplying more than 15,000 communities in the United
States alone.

The first plant had a capacity of about 750 horse power.
Today the combined capacity of all central station power
plants is nearly 20,000,000 horse power.

This plant began operation with fifty-nine customers.
Today there are nearly ten and one half million users of
electric service.

In 1882 the cost of operating a 16 candle power lamp
for one hour was 1.2 cents. Today on account of improve-
ments in the art of generating and distribution of electricity
and in the development of more efficient lamps a 100 candle
power lamp may be operated for an hour and a quarter.
