FOUR HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

JOHNSTON, Oct. 4.—A serious accident occurred on the highway in front of W. P. Craig's house Tuesday morning when a Ford car driven by E. A. Stanley was upset and the four occupants pinned underneath it.

The story of the accident as related by Mr. Stanley is about as follows:

In company with Mr. Bethel of the state engineer's office, Glen Wagner of Postersport and George Murphy of Wallawa, Mr. Stanley was driving to the head of O. S. gulch where the men had been measuring the construction work done by the North Pacific Construction Co. As the Ford was approaching the culvert near the Craig home one of the boys in the back seat remarked that he had had a few involuntarily as they had had a few involuntarily and just about that instant Mrs. Dan Wagoner passed. Mr. Stanley's car was very near the wall of the culvert on the right hand side of the road and without sensing the nearness of the approaching car, he turned slightly to the left in order to pass the concrete abutment of the culvert. At the time this was taking place another car was coming towards the culvert from the east and it is thought that in order to avoid a collision with it Mrs. Wagoner cut in a little too close to the Ford, the rear part of her car striking the front wheel of the smaller car. The front wheel of the Ford was demolished and the radius rod was broken. In endeavoring to steer clear of the deep ditch at the right of the road, Mr. Stanley pulled the car to the left and his sudden changing of its course caused it to turn over.

The four men were pinned underneath the car but Stanley had natural force coming from the opposite direction and fearing it might run into the wreck he made a superhuman effort to release himself and was successful in hitting the car high enough to crawl out. The other men were caught as they could not move and the car had to be lifted up before they could be pulled out. Mr. Stanley is of the opinion that the hit hurt him worse than the far he received when the car upset. Mr. Bethel's injuries are probably the most serious. He was badly cut about the mouth and received painful bruises about the head and body. Wagner and Murphy received only minor injuries and feel very fortunate to have gotten out of the accident as they did.

It is understood that Mr. Stanley has filed charges against Mrs. Wagoner for infringement of the highway rules.
