BROWN GUILTY OF LARCENY

Chairman Lasker of Shipping Board Orders Ships to Give up Liquor.

ALL WILL GO TO THE U. S. TREASURY

The order applies to all government ships operated by the board and under charter and of all private concerns.

FORD CARAVAN DEMONSTRATION PRAISEWORTHY

Parade Held This Morning; Demonstration in Afternoon; Radio, Dancing and Movies This Evening.

La Grande and scores of Union and Walla county citizens are celebrating with the Ford and Fordson power exposition today. Early this morning visitors began filing into the city to attend the parade, the demonstrations and the evening of fun that has been planned.

Big Parade.
The parade was held on Adams Avenue this morning at 11 o'clock and for a brief picturization of the affair, just imagine Ford coupes, Ford roadsters, Ford touring cars, Ford trucks, Fordson tractors, Lincoln cars, every imaginable kind of farming implements, and in fact practically every phase of the automotive industry, was represented. Entries numbered nearly 200 and many decorated cars proved a source of delight to the spectators. Jap Stevens, who came to this valley in 1862, drove a Ford today, claiming he was the oldest pioneer in the parade.

Demonstration.
The second item on the program of the visit of the Ford caravan was the demonstration being held at the west end of Grandy street this afternoon. Early this afternoon, the attendance was very satisfactory, and everything was going as per schedule.

This evening will be devoted to a general good time with a street dance, with music by the Mt. Angel Jazz orchestra, moving pictures and radio all listed on the program.

The caravan arrived in La Grande yesterday, about 4 o'clock and parked along Adams Avenue, east of Fir street, until this morning when the parade was held. Over 100 men accompanied it. To say that the caravan is covering lots of territory is not exaggeration as upon reaching their starting point at the conclusion of one of the most successful trips ever held, the total mileage covered will be over 4,000.

While in La Grande the demonstration is eliciting much approval from those attending and praise is being given to C. H. Tull, local manager, for his able handling of the affair.

The exhibition of Lincoln cars is one of the features of the exposition. I. T. Olson, in charge of this branch, says, "We've nothing to conceal and much to show."

The caravan will remain in La Grande over Sunday and will depart Monday morning at an early hour.
