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erly line of Hemlock Street to a line drawn at right angles to said Jefferson Avenue from the most westerly corner of Block 2, Cogran's Addition to the City of La Grande; Cove Avenue from the northerly line of Jefferson Avenue to the southerly line of Island Avenue and Island Avenue from the north line of Cove Avenue to a connection with the present pavement at the east city boundary and Tenth Street from the north line of M Avenue to the southerly line of Washington Avenue; Spruce Street from the northerly line of Washington Avenue to the northerly line of Adams Avenue.

All work to be done according to the plans and specifications heretofore adopted for this improvement. All bids must be accompanied by a certified check for five per cent of the amount bid and the Commission reserves the right to reject any or all bids.
