L. H. S. WINS FROM ALUMNI 21 TO SIX

Alumni Makes More Yardage; Fumbles Constant; Aerial Work Plentiful; Game Rough and Slow.

The high school team decisively defeated the Alumni yesterday afternoon on the high school field by the score of 21 to 6. Lynch, Alstott, Larson and Williams played the best game for the Blue and White, while Edie Larson, Garity and Bean shined on the Alumni team.

Neither team scored in the first quarter but the high school crossed the goal line in the second quarter, making the goal. In the third quarter the high school team scored and both teams tallied in the final half.

The Alumni playing was featured by aerial work and line plunger while the high schoolers relied on passes, plunges and end runs. The game came to a thrilling finish when Lynch, high school quarterback, plunged through the line on the 32-yard line and broke clear for a touchdown. The Blue and White outplayed the grade during the first half and the third quarter.

The Alumni players were a husky bunch and their defeat clearly points to La Grande's chances for the championship of eastern Oregon. La Grande has a better team early this season than she has had for several years at a corresponding time.

Plenty of rough playing and a quantity of disputes kept the spectators interested and for the Alumni Pat McGinnis carried off the honors of the meenest man, while Toots won the title in the kick, bite and scratch match. Sherwood showed his stuff on the high school and Alstott played a wicked game, being the hardest man to stop on the high school line. La Grande has no game scheduled until October 21, when they journey to Elgin to take on the highly touted team that defeated them 20 to 0 last season. Elgin has the same backfield but a slighter line and La Grande's chances of winning are bright.
