KIAMATH FALLS, Oct. 7.—Marsh- all Hooper, former vice president of the now defunct First State and Savings bank, has been indicted on a misdemeanor charge in connection with the alleged irregularities for which John W. Seaman and John Seaman, Jr., former president and cashier, were indicted yesterday.

Hooper was granted bail October 25 to enter plea of denials and was released under bond of \$1000.

Hooper is charged with unlawfully permitting the bank to loan Julia W. Seaman \$11,000, an amount then exceeding 20 per cent of the capital paid in and to which the Seaman family had no right of title at the time of the loan. Hooper was connected with the state banking department.
