ECONOMY MOTTO OF JOHN WELLS

Democratic Candidate for County Commissioners Is Interviewing Voters.

When John Wells of Imbler, who is running for county commissioner, stopped in La Grande today on his tour of the county to call the voters' attention to his candidacy, he said to the Observer: "I want to tell you that I am for economy and for all that word means. As a farmer and a taxpayer I can see the drift of the times and feel the pangs of heavy taxes with no prices for products of the farm. I noticed a few days ago in the Observer that my worthy opponent, Mr. Galloway, said he intended to disband the road master as soon as the contract is finished and to the county. My intention is that the road master should have been dismissed before he was hired and Union county would be much ahead. I liked Mr. Galloway's talk on economy, but he can't go any stronger than I can on the subject. I ask for a chance to show the people what I can do."

ROESCH COMPANY GET FRANKLINS

New Models With More Powerful Engine Arrive for Customers, Who Are Proud of Machines.

The new Franklin has arrived in La Grande and today many people are looking it over, examining the engine and admiring the excellent features which the machine possesses.
