AT SHERIDAN'S LAST DAY.

The famous story written by Charles Rann Kennedy which in dramatic form was first presented more than a decade ago, and still stands as one of the greatest successes in the history of the American stage, has been transformed into a motion picture play that sets a new high mark in the film industry.

"The Servant in the House" through the happy combination of a great story, perfect continuity, ideal cast and splendid direction, has been molded into a film masterpiece. It is the most pretentious vehicle that has ever been taken from the legitimate stage for screen production and many of the big minds in the motion picture world doubted that the transformation could be made. They maintained that only in the spoken drama could the powerful message contained in Mr. Kennedy's story be driven home.

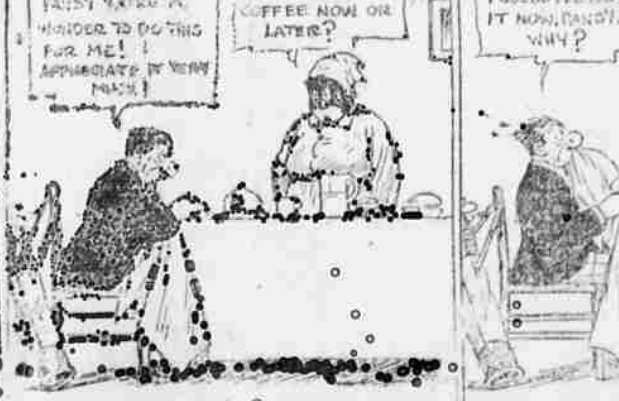
