## FARMS AND ORCHARDS PAY

Umatilla County Products Total Over Seven Million for This Year.

PENDLETON, Oct. 12.—Farm crops including fruits and small products totalled in value this year slightly over \$7,000,000 according to approximate figures prepared by Fred Benson, county agent. This is a drop of over \$2,000,000 from the same total of 1921. Considering the hard frosts which struck the fruits in the early summer and the hot which which shrank and shattered the wheat in July, this report is considered favorable by crop experts in this section.

**Wheat Big Crop.**  
Wheat is still the banner crop in this county by a wide margin. A total

of 226,900 acres of fall wheat brought an average of 21.5 bushels per acre while 13,000 acres of spring wheat averaged 12 bushels. The total crop is estimated at just 5,000,000 bushels. The valuation is set at \$4,750,000, the average price being 95 cents or five cents below last year's average. With a slightly lower average last year the wheat production of this county ran to practically \$7,000,000 bushels. The greatest crop ever recorded here.

There were 17,000 acres in barley in 1922 a drop of about 2,000 acres over 1921 owing to the low price received for barley last year, and the production this year was 200,000 bushels to 215,000 bushels last year. The value of the 1922 crop has been set at \$2,000,000.

Winds cut the oat production of this county in half this year. The valuation of the crop of 10,000 bushels is given at \$100,000 because most of the oat is sold at a premium for seed in this section.

**Alfalfa Second.**  
Alfalfa hay ranked second in crop valuation in this county with this year's cuttings valued at \$300,000. A slightly smaller average was in alfalfa this year an amount of the poor price of 1921, but the figure on alfalfa went up almost double this season and is the real saving of the cost and waste ends of the county. A total of 90,000 tons was cut this year on 29,000 acres.

Although wheat hay is reckoned mostly by the producers the valuation of the 42,000 tons grown on 28,000 acres at about one and one-half tons to the acre was \$200,000 this year. Wild hay grown on the prairie and upland country which was cut for feed totalled about a ton to the acre on 6,000 acres and its valuation this year is about \$6,000.

Corn produced a new crop in this section did well this year, over 1,400 tons being cut for forage. There were 600 acres and its total valuation is set at \$10,000.

**Apples, etc.**  
Apples, the prime fruit of Umatilla county, and which last year drew a total price of approximately \$528,000, were cut in half this year and the total valuation of the crop is one dollar per box for 240,000 boxes. Last year the crop was double and the

price about 15 cents better per box. Apples last year brought more than 100 cents a box. There are 200,000 bearing apple trees.

The 22,000 bearing peach trees of the county this year only bore about half the same as last year and with the price about the same on the total of 40,000 boxes, the total valuation is \$20,000.

Approximately 78,000 boxes of peaches were harvested from 11,000 trees for a total of \$12,000.

Less than half the plum and plum crop was harvested this year over the 1921 crop. Where last year there were 200,000 bushels gathered, this year about 100,000 bushels is the crop and the price of the entire crop is about \$90,000, where it was \$100,000 in 1921.

**Cherries Surprise.**  
The cherry crop of this year was a big surprise when its valuation exceeded that of the plum crop. Twenty-thousand trees brought a total of \$120,000.

The grape crop will total \$9,000 with 25,000 vines bearing 60,000 pounds. The great decrease in this crop was due to the late frost which froze down to early vines.

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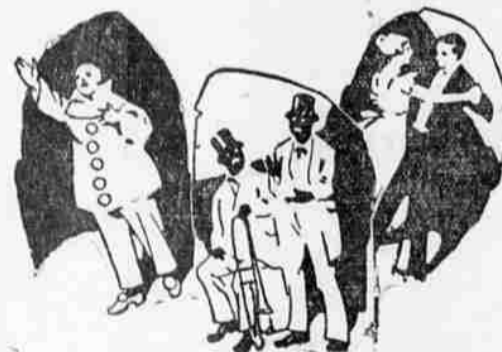
