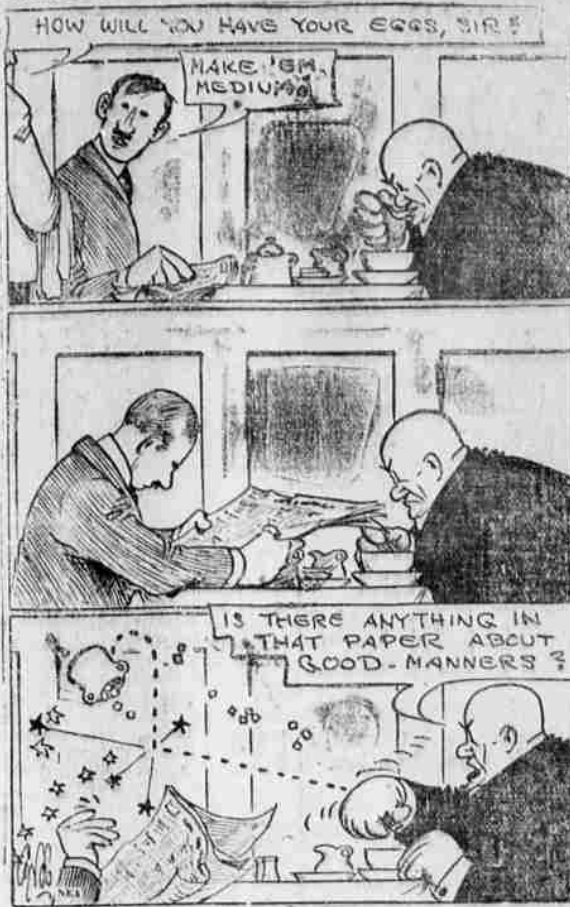

"SMILIN' THROUGH" ARRIVES AT ARCADE.

With broken records in over a hundred leading playhouses of America to lend authenticity to its billing, Norma Talmadge's latest First National super-drama "Smilin' Through" heralded as "the crowning achievement of the screen" began a three-day showing this afternoon at the Arcade Theatre.

To accurately describe the story of "Smilin' Through" would take pages and require a command of English that few people might boast.
