ERADICATION OF
TUBERCULOSIS

Disease is Very Low Among
Cattle in Union County;
Only Twelve Head React-
ed to Tests.

The eradication of tuberculosis in cattle and dairy herds in Union county has been very successful this year, states H. G. Avery, county agent, who has been assisting in the testing of cattle during the spring and summer for signs of the disease. A veterinary from the Bureau of Animal Industry, spent several weeks in this section at various times this year, testing the cattle.

A total of 1736 head of cattle were tested for 237 different farmers and of this number only 12 reacted to the tests. They were taken to Portland and condemned and slaughtered under federal inspection. The total numbers tested was five times greater this year than in the previous year.

Tuberculosis was found to be very much in evidence in several herds in this section seven years ago but careful testing and subsequent eradication of the diseased animals has tended to reduce the disease to a very low level. The testing has been carried on without expense to the farmers as the county agent furnished the transportation from farm to farm and also made arrangements for the holding of the tests.

Several applications for tests have been made to the Bureau of Animal Industry and promises have been made to send another veterinary to this district in the spring to complete the eradication of the dreaded "t. b." among the cattle.

PRICES FOR PRUNES

received only \$25 per ton for their prunes.

This year all received \$35 per ton. Last year we commenced picking prunes on the 15th of August and three and probably more cars were rejected because they were too green. This year we commenced picking on the 21st of August and all of our prunes went on the market in a ripe condition and all packages were neatly labeled with the association's new copyrighted Blue Mountain Brand label.

Our association closed its prune pool this year on the 5th of October and was ready at that time to settle with all growers. This it will be noticed was the earliest settlement period ever obtained in the valley before.

In all the deliberations of your board of directors the utmost harmony has prevailed and all discussions were up on a high plane of general good and all selfish interest was entirely absent.

Mr. W. E. Parson, our sales manager, has not only demonstrated his superior qualifications as a salesman, but the open, frank and honest manner in which he has conducted the business affairs of our association has inspired confidence in his absolute integrity among all those who have come in contact with his dealings. At the beginning of the year Mr. Parson insisted that he should give a bond of \$50,000 guaranteeing the faithful performance of his duties. He also asked that a sales committee be appointed to advise with him regarding all sales made. He also requested the appointment of a business representative of the association to occupy the office with him to keep the books, handle the funds and countersign all checks.

On the sales committee your board selected Mr. S. A. Miller, E. P. Jensen and C. E. Berry. As a business representative Mr. George A. Price, former cashier of the First National bank of Milton was selected.

The Cherry Growers Co-operative Association this year attempted to sell their cherry crop to the highest bidder. A number of bids were received but the highest was 11 cents per pound which they rejected. They afterwards with Mr. W. E. Parson as sales manager, marketed their entire crop at an average of 12 1/2 cents per pound, making a saving on their entire tonnage of about \$17,000.

In the perfecting of our organization and the successful conduct of its business much valuable assistance has been received from various

sources and at this point I wish to express my appreciation and valuable assistance continue to grow as the years go to thank the growers for their publications. 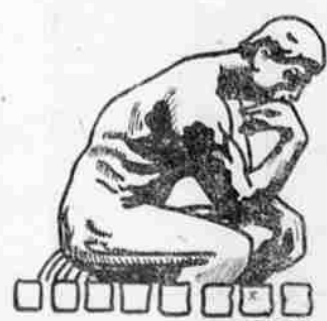
