

JAILBREAKERS LIBERTY WAS SHORT LIVED

Men Who Overpowered Los Angeles Guards Yesterday Now in Prison.

FOUND IN HOME OF CALIFORNIA CONVICT

Oregon Preacher was Ring Leader of the Bold Act House is Surrounded and Corrupts Taken By Surprise.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18.—Three jailbreakers, Herbert Wilson, former of Brownville, Oregon, preacher, mail carrier and convicted murderer, Adam Blasey alias Ward, convicted murderer, and Guido Spikola, convicted robber, were recaptured here today after 24 hours of liberty.

They were taken without a struggle in the house of an ex-convict not far from where the automobile which they had stolen had been abandoned.

Short Treaster and his posse surrounded the house and effected the capture with the same suddenness that the trio surprised the jailers in their break yesterday.

The capture resulted from the use of a plan which had been formulated for some time. After he had attempted to break jail last April in which Robert Cox, Wilson's partner, was killed by Sheriff Learned Wilson, he had planned to use the home of Tom Garwood, who was known as Wilson's pal.

Immediately after the escape yesterday the sheriff had the Garwood house watched and early today three men were sent to sink into the house, a heavy posse surrounded the house.

STUDENTS PAY OWN EXPENSES

Over Sixty Per Cent of University of Oregon Students are Self Supporting, Says M. C. A.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 18.—Over 60 per cent of the students attending the University of Oregon this year are self supporting, according to a report made by the University M. C. A. employment bureau. The report states that the number of men working this year is greater than last year, many students being employed to the campus during the latter part of August, over a month before the commencement of the fall term of the university, in order to take positions that were open at that time.

Mrs. Charlotte R. Donnelly, secretary of the employment bureau, said that approximately four hundred letters were sent out to the business men of Eugene, before the university opened its fall term, asking them to cooperate with the bureau in securing employment for students. She says that the response to these letters was good.

"The M. C. A. of the bureau is to furnish the experienced and qualified to do the work to which they are assigned," said Mrs. Donnelly. "If the work is by students sent out by the bureau, we see that it is made right at once."

Many are also given work through the bureau, said Mrs. Donnelly. She has been made among the students for an association of working men. Frequent meetings will be held at which educational and employment programs will be presented.

"SKEET" COUNTS ON LINE TO STOP ELGIN SATURDAY

Elgin-La Grande Football Game Saturday is Expected to Be Deciding Factor in Championship Race.

What promises to be one of the intercollegiate football classics for this season will be played at Elgin Saturday afternoon when "Skeet" Reynolds' proteges will attempt to humble the championship aspirant Elginites on their own field. With an overwhelming defeat over Imbler, Elgin appears stronger than last year and have their eyes firmly fixed on the '22 pennant.

La Grande, as it appears at present, has the best chance to head the championship contenders from their hoped for pinnacle of purple, and if the Blue and White are successful, La Grande should celebrate another Eastern Oregon championship about November 30. If they fail to crush the touted Elginites, things will look mighty black for the local boys.

Elgin Schedule Easy.
With the exception of the game with La Grande this week Elgin is facing an easy schedule compared to the one the Blue and White tackled. Elgin will take on Enterprise at Elgin on November 18, and will end the season Thanksgiving day at Union. If La Grande is defeated they may seek to play Pendleton or Baker. Therefore, if Elgin should come through victorious Saturday she should have a clear road to the championship.

Dope points to an Elgin supremacy of about two touchdowns but more than once the dope bucket has been kicked over and hopelessly bungled up. When the dope is analyzed a little further, however, Elgin's supremacy on paper vanishes into the ozone. La Grande's season with a green team played last year, Elgin trounced Imbler 64 to 0 last week with their team well rounded off and nearly in mid-season form. With a clockwork interference they had the Imblerites fuddled throughout the game. But Imbler showed a weaker front to Elgin than to La Grande despite the two intervening weeks, and about the only advantage that can be credited Elgin in the coming game will be that it is to be played on their home field.

Counts on Line.
To offset the brilliant and vicious interference that Elgin has perfected, "Skeet" has a line that will rank with any went of the Cascades. From tackle to tackle it will average about 155 pounds and flanked by a couple of crack ends, it is expected to turn the tide of victory from the hands of the Elgin boys.

Coach Reynolds expects to take his entire squad, of 27 players, to Elgin and with a number of fresh substitutes ready to go in at any moment, it will be possible to keep steady attack going throughout the game. A number of rosters are going along and everybody that can, the high school urges, is asked to support this game and attempt to be present because it really is the championship game of the season.

CONVENTION HALL, New Orleans, Oct. 18.—A demand for roll call in order that the "world may know where we stand on the bonus question" was followed today at the American Legion convention by a viva voce vote affirming the report of the resolutions committee which declared the Legion will "continue to fight for legislation until it is enacted."

The decision called for by Commander MacNider resulted in the announcement of a unanimous vote. One delegate who voted "no" by mistake cried out his apology when hundreds of delegates yelled, "who is he?"

Baseball Commissioner Landis today told the convention that the Legion's stand on adjusted compensation was based on justice. Sentiment of the south was plainly crystallized today for Calvin W. Owsley, of Texas, for national commander.

Following the business session the delegates marched in parade this afternoon. More than thirty thousand were in line.

EMPLOYMENT CONDITIONS ARE NORMAL

Outside of Big Cities, Employment Conditions are Normal on Pacific Coast.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.—Outside of the larger cities, employment conditions on the Pacific Coast were generally normal during September, according to the report of J. A. Kelly, in Francisco, district director for the employment service, United States department of Labor, made public here today. Demand for agricultural workers and skilled building artisans in many places exceeded the supply, showing slight improvement in shipbuilding remained at a standstill.

Mr. Kelly's report, covering the states of California, Oregon and Washington, in part follows:

CALIFORNIA—Unemployment in larger cities continued chiefly to iron and steel, casual and office workers, lumber operating to capacity and all skilled workers are in demand. Agricultural and fruit workers report a shortage of experienced help. Steady demand for construction laborers on highways and power development. Building continues very active in most sections, and a shortage of finish carpenters and bricklayers generally reported. Southern oil fields operating to capacity, but San Joaquin valley and coast fields at only one-third capacity. Mining improved but still below normal. Ship building at a standstill.

OREGON—Outside of the large industrial centers, employment conditions show improvement, due chiefly to active demand for agricultural and construction workers. This demand is largely responsible for absorption of unemployed from other industries. Building continues active, but there is no apparent shortage of labor. There are no large outside developments or construction work contemplated for the immediate future.

WASHINGTON—Employment conditions generally improved over August. There has been a falling off in the number employed in the lumber industry due to forest fires, but this industry is still operating to capacity. Food products show a decrease in demand of temporary seasonal lay-off. Large demand for harvest hands, affording considerable employment and absorbing many workers from other industries. Iron and steel shows activity, but not yet up to capacity. Surplus of railroad repair workers due to labor controversy. Building active, and there is no unemployment in this industry. Demand for building trades mechanics of all kinds in the large centers. Housing conditions generally improved.

Poltras, who makes her home near Vancouver, Washington, where she owns a large truck garden, returned to her home today and before leaving requested the La Grande Investment company to send her some seeds from some of the mammoth squashes that are on display in the establishments' show windows.

"We have some fine vegetables and fruit in Washington," she remarked to a member of the company. "and I fully appreciate the fine display you have representing the products of the Grande Ronde valley. My object in requesting some of the seeds from these wonderful squashes is to see if they will bear the same mammoth squashes in my own garden."

Another item in the window that is attracting considerable attention is a potato dubbed the "Elk Spud," because it, as Mr. Williams says, is purple on the outside and purple clear through.

OPENING HALTED
