MONTE CRISTO A GREAT FILM

Makers of the Old Masterpiece Have Done an Excellent Job and the Play is First Class.

After all the best films of today are the old plays put into pictures. This was demonstrated last night when the Arcade theatre presented Monte Cristo, the old masterpiece which James O'Neil played for so many years. O'Neil in Monte Cristo was as staple and as classical as was Joe Jefferson in Rip Van Winkle. Monte Cristo is more than a play for entertainment. It is a classic for deep study and the audiences will each contain many people who leave the theatre with the entertainment features of the play snugly tucked away in the background, while the artistic features predominate in thought and study.

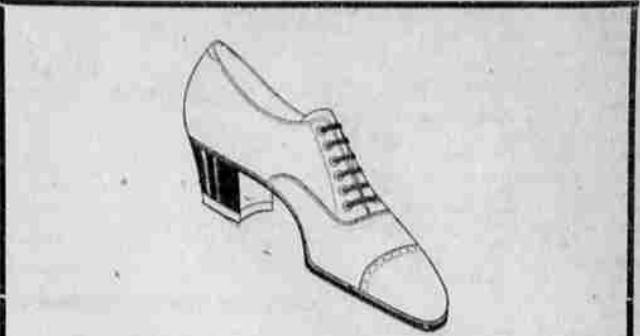
