## AT SHERRYS

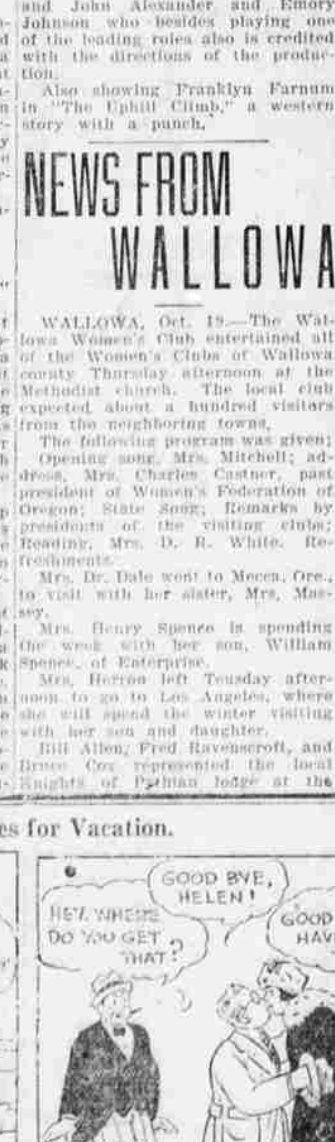
"IN THE NAME OF THE LAW" TODAY AND TOMORROW
